117-120 Mountain Road: Property owner **Norman Wilson** is at it once again. Now he is attempting to build a "tennis court" on the roof of his building. On Friday, November 2nd, he began installing 20-foot high fence poles along the perimeter of his building. Complaints have been made to the Zoning Official and the Building Code Official but as of now, nothing seems to have been done to stop him. Incredible as it sounds, Mr. Wilson has been constructing this project for the last seven years despite neighborhood opposition. And there is no end in sight!

This summer he continually worked on the weekends and after hours. It appears that he has someone living on the premises even though there has been no Certificate of Occupancy issued for this location. In addition, there are no current building plans on file at the Building Department and the City is lax in their overview of this project.

This summer he actually hung scaffolding off his roof extending over another person's property to

work on his own roof extension. He never even had the courtesy to request permission from the owner. To add insult to injury, the police and the Building Department refused to make him comply with either proper permits or proof of insurance.

It is time that the residents realize that this project is setting a bad precedent for the zoning in our community. If Mr. Wilson can get away with building what he wants, when he wants and for as long as he wants, other owner-developers will follow suit.

All concerned residents are encouraged to call the City to complain about this project and demand that Mr. Wilson comply with the local zoning and building regulations. **Anthony Lambiase, Zoning Official can be reached at 547- 6564 and Building Code Official Michael Regan can be reached at 547-5068.**

Jehovah's Witness Project: The New Jersey Congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses (CJW) has submitted plans to build a two story "house of worship" in our neighborhood at New York Avenue and South Street, the site of the old Episcopalian church that burnt down many years ago. The application is requesting variances for parking, setback and lot-size because the project is too big for this location. Neighbors are concerned that the project will have a negative impact on this stable residential community of one and two family houses.

The CJW is requesting a variance to provide far fewer parking spaces that should be required for a building that could potentially accommodate over 400 people on a daily basis. Their plans call for two auditoriums, or large meeting rooms, with adjacent overflow areas. At a minimum, the CJW should be required to provide approximately 43 spaces and not the 19 that they are proposing.

The City should do an independent study to evaluate what impact this project will have on the residential traffic flow and parking in this area. It should not rely on any report commissioned and submitted by the CJW.

This project also requires variances for setbacks in both the side and front yards because the building is too large for the site. The new zoning code requires that all houses of worship must provide

a minimum width of 100 feet. Their lot configuration is only 62 feet – 38 feet narrower than required.

Finally, the CJW will be holding services every weekday night and it is not known at this time what the weekend schedules will be. That translates into parking, traffic and crowd problems in this quiet neighborhood on a daily basis.

The community is organizing to oppose the current project application. However, plans are being made to set-up meetings with both the City and the CJW to discuss this project and hopefully convince them to downsize it for the location. For more information, contact **Marje Daly at 963-6564.**

The Planning Board will hear this application on **December 18th**. The original hearing date of October 30th was adjourned because the CJW did not provide adequate notice to the adjacent property owners within two hundred feet.

520 Palisade Avenue: The Planning Department has begun preliminary discussions with developers concerning the Old Fire House building located on Palisade Avenue between Bowers and South Streets. It appears that they are interested in converting the building into residential condominiums on the upper floors and retail space on the ground floor. Residents who want to get involved in this project should come to RNA's November 13th meeting.

MEETING

MINUTES: October 9, 2001

RNA's October meeting was opened at 7:55 PM by the Chair.

POLICE: The first guest was the new police commander of the North District, **Captain Joseph Pizzalenti**. The Captain stated that for the most part crime was down in our district. The police presence on our streets had resulted in giving out 19 summonses for disorderly groups and four people getting arrested. While some of the police have been deployed to special duty because of the events of September 11th, there are still NTF officers and a special narcotics unit working in the North District, making progress in getting drugs and dealers off the streets.

One of the concerns voiced at the meeting was the need for daily patrolling on Mountain Road, which is attracting loiterers and becoming a litter problem again. It was suggested that this road would be a good candidate for the City's plans for camera surveillance. Another concern was the sometimes-unsatisfactory response of the radio personnel when taking complaint calls. The Captain stated that the Mayor would like to see a better blend of police and civilians in the radio room because civilians are not properly trained to understand the importance of certain complaints. He also suggested that the more information that can be given when calling in any suspicious activity, the better able the police would be to respond. **Lieut. Robert Kilduf** and **P.O. Ed Rakowski** were also in attendance.

NEIGHBORHOOD IMPROVEMENT

DISTRICT: Our second guest was **Wayne Anderson** of the NID. Wayne gave us an update on the status of our regular **NID Manager Ron Clemente**, who had been in a work accident this summer. Ron is on the mend but still not able to return to work. **Annarose Smith**, a NID Code Enforcement Officer, is now our temporary contact. The new administration would like to reorganize the NID and divide it into the Police Department and the Department of Housing and Economic Development.

Wayne took some of our complaints, including the illegal flea market on Hobson Street and the return of the trash containers on the corner of Franklin and Ogden. **Wayne Anderson can be reached at 547-4654** and **CEO Smith can be reached at 547-5683 or at 4982, voice mail #8029.**

COMMUNITY EVENTS UPDATE: On October 28th, there will be a Halloween parade in Riverview-Fisk Park. Adults are needed to help carry the giant puppets.

On Saturday, November 10th, RNA will host its annual holiday party for the residents of the Harbor View Health Care Facility. Volunteers are needed to distribute refreshments and donations are needed for gift baskets.

RNA also helped long time member **Robert Boesch** celebrate his birthday.

COMMUNITY DISCUSSION: The membership spent the rest of the meeting discussing the following topics of recent concern:

- 1) Debris is still being dumped on Holland Street;
- 2) A stop sign is needed at the corner of Bowers and Ogden to control speeding cars;
- 3) The children's playground in Riverview-Fisk Park is still being used as a dog-run by certain local residents;
- 4) A local gas station on Patterson Plank Road and New York Avenue does not post its gasoline prices;
- 5) There is a daily presence of strangers loitering along Ogden Avenue – appearing to be “casing” the houses; and
- 6) Certain unoccupied houses are being used by trespassers – possibly for illegal activities.

It was suggested that RNA plan a meeting in the future without guests so that we can address these complaints more adequately.

WARD C COUNCILMAN: Steve Lipski, the newly elected representative of the Journal Square Ward, arrived late because of a City Council Caucus meeting held earlier that evening. In response to a question about the chronic mini van problem on Palisade Avenue, Lipski stated that he had recently met with representatives from State Senator Kenny, and Congressmen Rothman and Menendez. They all agreed that the solution was for state regulation of these commuter vans and committed their offices to solving the problem.

When asked when the street repaving would start for the long overdue Palisade Avenue project, the Councilman promised to make inquiries and get back to us. [*Since the October meeting, the contractors have milled Palisade Avenue in preparation for the new street paving, which should occur before Thanksgiving.*]

He also stated that he had discussions with NJ Transit (NJT) regarding the blasting of the PATH tunnel under southern part of our neighborhood. Unfortunately, NJT appears to be ignoring the complaints about their hours of blasting and the resultant noise, dust and rodent dislocation.

In response, the Councilman announced that he and fellow Councilman Mariano Vega had recently tabled a proposal to build an elevated station for the Hudson Bergen Light Rail at Congress Street and Paterson Plank Road because the request lacked

the necessary engineering information needed to make a decision.

He also mentioned that the City is considering extending the municipal permit-parking program to Beacon and Jefferson along Palisade Avenue.

Finally he suggested that all the local block and neighborhood associations in his ward should meet together to discuss their common concerns.

The meeting closed at 10:20 PM.
