Plans for New Neighborhood Park UPDATE

The following is a summary of a letter dated Dec. 9th from Councilwoman Nancy Gaynor:

Following our meeting on Saturday, November 13, 1993, I met with Robert Cerchio, Chief Architect, concerning Cuneo Park. The following modifications will be presented to me in a final draft.

- 1) A sitting bench will be added to the south side of the playground on the opposite side of the concrete walk.
- 2) In the main seating area to the west of the playground the bench will continue in a "C" shape filling in the missing portion.
- 3) The four planting areas will be mounded to discourage ball playing.
- 4) Shrubbery will be planted in areas surrounding the playground.

Matters discussed, but will not be pursued for reasons stated.

- 1) The sidewalk at western end of site will remain as an access point for maintenance equipment.

The following items will be pursued if budget allows.

- 1) 4' fence will be erected around perimeter of the playground. No gates will be installed (cont. on page 2)

Letter to the Editor of Jersey Journal

All of hudson County Boulevard was declared a historic site by Mayor Hague. At the same time the Palisades along the waterfront were declared historic sites by the Rockefellers and Harrimans, all the way up to West Point.

Mayor Hague gave each town along the waterfront a piece of the land separately to be preserved and to protect the Palisades along the waterfront. Later on the County sold some of its own land to developers which was in violation of the original save the Palisades agreement and high rise apartments began to appear on County parkland along the waterfront as surplus land.

These projects like the Doric in Union City, Sprung up over night before the local community was aware of what was happening. County parkland was sold down the river to out of town developers before the general public was aware of what was really happening. Because most of this land was all county property much of it became sweetheart deals without paying taxes because many records were lost with sloppy bookkeeping. (continued on page 4)

Proposed Park layout for Cuneo Place, submitted by Camille Cesari December 1993 SK-4
Park features;

1) Entry Space - Entry gate located on Ogden Avenue. Objective to provide a physical transition space between street and park in the form of a landscaped seating area.

2) Formal Gardens - Consists of two formal planting beds, seating, walkways and border plantings. Objective to serve as a transition space between entry area playground. Affords the neighborhood the opportunity to plant its own garden. The formal gardens offers a passive area for park users, seating is integrated throughout. Border planting should be interesting and varied, providing year round interest.

3) Playground - Includes waterspray area, play equipment, seating and border planting. Objective, to provide the neighborhood with a multi-use play area. 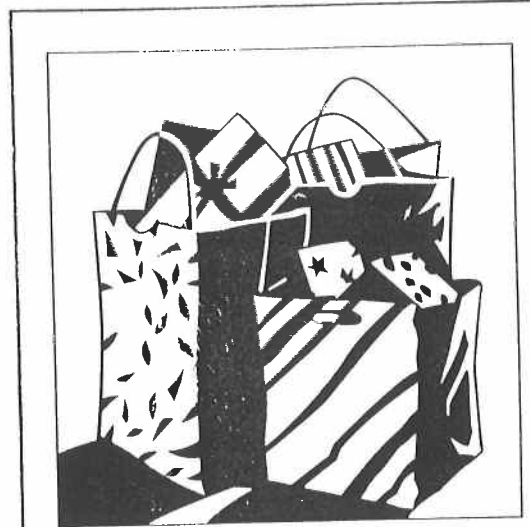
