## MEETING MINUTES

The RNA meeting held on February 9, 1993 was well attended and had a full agenda. Police Captain James Shamburg of the North District spoke about Jersey City's community-based police program and specifically what it would mean for our own community.

In the North District, there are nine residential walking posts. One police officer is assigned to each post, working from 3:45 pm to midnight. Officer Shawn Carson is assigned to Post #6, which covers Ogden and Palisade Avenues from Cuneo Place to Bowers Street. Officer Steven Sansevere is assigned to Post #8 that includes Palisade and Ogden Avenues from Bowers Street north to Congress Street. (Officer Sansevere is on patrol Monday to Friday because he is also the local D.A.R.E official.) An additional walking patrolman has also been assigned to Palisade Avenue during the daytime hours. Captain Shamburg told RNA that the North District will be getting two motor scooters and the officer patrolling Palisade Avenue will be assigned to one of the scooters.

The Captain plans to have the Officer Shawn Carson attend RNA's meetings to hear first-hand from the residents what and where the problems are. The Captain encouraged all the residents to call Officers Carson and Sansevere to notify them of chronic problems. These quality of life crimes include loud blasting radios and parking violations. **To get in touch with either Community-based Officer Carson or Sansevere, call telephone number 547-5354 and leave a message for them.**

The Captain said that since July of 1992 there has been a 25% increase in manpower in the North District and he hopes for even more officers assigned to the district in the future. He said a proposal to create a Narcotics Squad in the North District, which would strictly investigate drug-dealing in our area, is being considered. He believes that a such a squad would be better than the current city-wide Narcotics Unit because it would address the unique narcotics problems in the Heights.

On the subject of parking, the Captain said he is still working on the problem of commercial vehicles parking overnight on streets in the Heights. Tickets are being issued and the police hope to get the situation under control.

The Captain issued a warning: Don't walk up Paterson Plank Road from Hoboken. Police are aware of a group from (continued on page two)

## Meeting Minutes (continued)

Hoboken that committed a mugging and then ran back down to Hoboken. Police have set up a surveillance but as of yet have not apprehended anyone yet. Regarding the closed cliff roads, the Captain publicly stated that he fully supports the reopening of Mountain Road to improve the security of the neighborhood.

The Captain also informed RNA that there has been a six week burglary program that netted 17 arrests. He said that burglars use several methods to check if anyone is home, including surveilling a house, knocking on the door, calling on the telephone and posing as a utility person.

Riverview-Fiske Park came up in the discussion. The Captain said it is difficult to enforce a curfew, but he will have Officer Carson tell everyone to get out of the Park at 10 pm. He stated that a sign notifying the public of the 10 pm closing must be posted in the Park.

The next speaker was Pattie Gordon, a vice-president of the Jersey City Historical Preservation Association, who spoke about the upcoming Council vote to buy the Loew 's Theatre for \$325,000.00 from Hartz Mountain. (As of February 10th, The Jersey City City Council approved the purchase of the Theatre.)

Ms. Gordon stressed that the Theatre is an important part of the revitalization of Journal Square. She said it's been proven that restoring old theatres help revive run-down urban areas across the country. The hope is that the reopening of the Loew's Theatre would bring back a healthy night life to Journal Square and culture to Jersey City. At the end of the discussion, RNA voted to support the purchase of the Theatre.

The never-ending problem of our local mail delivery was brought up next. A suggestion was made to write a letter to the Postal Service stating that our local carrier, Karen is doing an outstanding job and to stop blaming her for the Ogden Avenue delivery problems. It was also decided to invite Postal officials from Newark to a future meeting for a face-to-face discussion of this issue.

Next, we opened the nominations for RNA officers for the 1993-1994 term. The nominations will remain open till the end of the March meeting, at which time the elections will be held.

Chair Maria Tuzzo suggested that we think about when RNA should hold its next Flea Market, either this spring or next fall. This topic will be on the March agenda. Before the meeting adjourned, Mrs. Marie Tuzzo was congratulated for becoming a great grandmother.

Please join us on Tuesday, March 9th for our next meeting at the Harbor View Health care Center at 7:30 pm. Don't forget to bring your annual RNA dues.

## CONRAD'S CORNER

When the early Christians were being persecuted, they worshipped in the catacombs of Rome until they became strong and were able to build their first Christian churches. So it was with Ascension Church on South Street and New York Avenue when it burned down about six years ago, except that they had enough funds of their own to rebuild a new church. But Bishop Spong seized the funds and would not give them back to the Church.

The congregation was outraged but they were able to raise enough funding again to do over the basement. It was just as if Christ was watching and helping them. But then the Bishop sent an emissary with instructions to close the Church and tear it down. The members of the congregation thought this was like the work of the devil because it was hard to comprehend why the diocese would do this after they worked so hard to rebuild their Church.

Have Episcopalians become a commercial venture? Look at Christ Hospital's one mile of private property which is not paying taxes and yet charges patients and visitors alike for parking! Christ Hospital tore down a lot of housing which had been paying taxes, to build their giant parking lot on the cliff.

Since it seems the Episcopal Church is no longer a religious institution but is a profitable commercial venture, it should pay taxes as any other private company does.

The funds taken away from Ascension Church are enough to buy up some more houses along Palisade Avenue for Christ Hospital which will take the properties off the tax lists. As Christ Hospital acquires more and more property along the Avenue and takes them off the tax lists, it is the Jersey City homeowners who will make up the difference with an increase in their own taxes.



## A NEW PERSHING FIELD ICE HOCKEY RINK?

Dear Mayor Schundler,

The Jersey Journal published a public notice on February 15, 1993 announcing that the City is taking bids and going ahead with the erection of a new ice hockey rink in Pershing Field Park.

Considering the fiscal straits that Jersey City is faced with, I think this project should be postponed.

The new hockey rink is, at best, of limited service to the general population of Jersey City. It is being built to serve about two hundred hockey players - many of whom do not reside in Jersey City.

The interest payments needed to finance the project would be equivalent to the current property tax imposed on about one hundred houses in the immediate area of Pershing Field.

In view of the fact that our City is currently operating without a fiscal budget in place I remind you that all of the moneys spent to the date of the final passage of the 1992-93 budget will have to be included in that budget. The tax rate will have to reflect all these expenditures regardless of the amount of increase over last year's rate.

I ask that the Pershing Field Ice Hockey Rink project be tabled or stopped for the present.

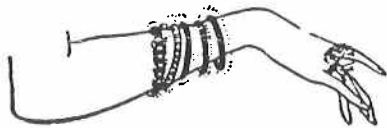

## ASCENSION CHURCH

As we go to press, Ascension Church is finally be forced to close its doors. On February 28th, the Diocese of Newark plans to hold a final service at the church. The people of Ascension have no desire to participate in this "service of thanksgiving" for the proposed death of their church. However, they do believe it is important for them to be present at that time as a form of public protest and so they intend to gather at New York Avenue and South Street to demonstrate their feelings.

They believe that their purpose is to remain together as a congregation to worship God and try to meet the spiritual needs of their community. They hope that their continued presence will serve as witness to the forcible taking of their money and property.

They ask that their neighbors pray for them and for the day when Ascension shall be released from the tyranny of the Newark diocese.
