LOOKING FOR A PART TIME JOB?

JERSEY CITY MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS

For the upcoming municipal elections, RNA is inviting the candidates for mayor and the council positions of Ward C, Ward D and at-large to our next two meetings. RNA has decided against debates but instead will set-up informal get-to-know sessions. Each candidate will be asked to make a 10 minute presentation and then answer questions from our membership. [The Heights Coalition is organizing formal debates which will be announced within the month.]

Mayoral candidates Jeremiah Healey and Jaime Vasquez will be guest speakers at the March 11th meeting. Gerry McCann has accepted and Bret Schundler has been invited to the April 8th meeting. Council candidates will be invited to the April 8th meeting.

To make these meetings productive, RNA requests that each member prepare several questions for each candidate about local problems or issues.



RNA COMMUNITY GARDENS

The community garden in Riverview-Fisk Park will soon reopen for its third season. Located across Ogden Avenue from the basketball courts, the garden provides free space for our neighbors to grow their own vegetables and flowers.

Gardeners from the last two seasons know first hand how much fun it is to plant something and watch it grow. They also know how rewarding it is to set a good example and see it have a positive effect on the neighborhood. Any person living in the nearby area is eligible for garden space. The only requirement is that they must agree to maintain their plot throughout the growing season. Children must bring an adult with them when applying for garden space.

MEETING MINUTES: February 11, 1997

NOMINATIONS: The meeting began with the opening of the nominations for the annual election of RNA officers. (See article on page one for the list of candidates).

TRAFFIC ENGINEERING: Pat Blake, Supervisor of Traffic Investigations with the Jersey City Division of Traffic Engineering was the guest speaker at our February meeting. Ms. Blake is in charge of placement and installation of all signals, signs, traffic controls, pavement markings, public service lights, permit parking, and reserved handicap parking throughout the City.

Traffic Engineering (TE) is presently looking into permit parking for north Palisade and Ogden Avenues. TE officials have been surveying license plates in this area during the day to see if the parked cars are registered to residents or out-of-town commuters. If a large portion are found to be commuters, this means that residents are being prevented from parking on their own streets. The City would then offer permit parking to the local residents.

Permit parking would restrict parking for non-permit holders to 2 hours maximum, in an effort to limit out-of-towners parking on the neighborhood streets. It is suspected that commuters drive to our area to park, catch the buses and transit vans and avoid additional zone fares on buses. These permits would cost \$1 a permit for residents and workers in the area. To obtain a permit, the vehicle must be clear of any parking tickets.

TE is also reviewing all handicap permits older than 6 months, to insure that all are merited.

There was discussion of the problem of speeding, which Ms. Blake says is a city wide problem. In particular, it was noted that Ogden Avenue between Griffith and Congress is subject to this problem, especially in the morning rush hour. Speed bumps and rumble strips were suggested, but are not legal for this situation. Signs will be put up in the near future, and the

police will be asked to set up a radar speed trap. In the spring, TE will paint '25 MPH' on the pavement, but street markings are not enforceable. "Children at Play" signs will be considered for the street running through Riverview-Fisk Park. Another option discussed for this through street was to 'vacate' the Park block. This would involve City Council and the Zoning Board; TE would be involved only to study & report.

A stop sign was suggested for Ogden at Bowers. Ms. Blake agreed to study the problem, including accident analysis for the intersection.

Palisade Avenue's truck route status was discussed. In order to repeal this status, state law requires that another equivalent north-south route would have to be designated. Ms. Blake explained that trucks do not need justification to travel on a truck route, although a bill of lading is needed for them to travel on side streets.

RNA requested a 'keep intersection clear' sign for the intersection of Palisade & Griffith.

Ms. Blake's department also handles PSE&G lighting. For repairs, get the pole number (on a metal plate on the pole, letters & numbers ending in 'JC') and call Traffic Engineering (547-4470). For new lights, a letter is needed.

Ms. Blake also agreed to study the recent traffic and parking problems at Woods Place, where the Popular Supermarket and the Christ Hospital clinic have brought in more traffic and new parking demands. TE will do an accident analysis for this intersection.

Popular Supermarket's loading zone on Palisade Ave has been rescinded but is in the process of being reestablished. The resolution has been passed Councilman Gaughan needs to approve it. The loading zone would be smaller than original one that A&P had.

Harbor View's loading zone is still on hold. Ms. Blake will check into it. Ms. Blake stated she would submit a written report to RNA discussing each of these issues.

NEIGHBORHOOD TASK FORCE (NTF) POLICE: Police officers Lorenzo Tosado, Scott Schnee, David Murawinski (new to our neighborhood), Sgt. Lisi and Sgt. Robert Kilduff reported on police activities in the area. (The other two NTF officers for our area, not present at the meeting, are Keith Armstrong and Mark Conroy.)

The officers will ask for additional patrols in the Palisade/Franklin/Ogden area from 1AM to 5AM to address loitering and possible drug dealing reported. They attribute this new late night activity to the success of the NTF police, who work the 2PM to 10PM shift. They may reevaluate the midnight shift schedule based on this information.

The officers updated several prior RNA concerns:

a) The tow truck that was parked in Riverview-Fisk Park for months was finally removed;

b) The police spoke to the plumbing store on Palisade that allowed their dog to run loose in the Park and streets, and it is believed the problem is cleared up;

c) The police informed the group that parole was denied for a local man who had been convicted of the burglary of one of our neighbors and he will finish out his sentence in jail.

RNA SPRINGTIME ACTIVITIES: Organizing for the spring flea market will start in the next month. Volunteers have agreed to meet before the March meeting to start planning. Proposed dates for the event are June 7, with rain date June 14.

The Community Garden will hold its first planning session beginning in early March. Interested gardeners should call Greg at 792-6390.

Joan Earls, the Director of the Department of Recreation and Cultural Affairs, says she's ready to start hiring local people for the summer basketball league. She would also like to have other athletic & nonathletic activities in the Park this summer, and will hire part time seasonal workers to support this.

A motion was made and approved to spend \$100 for mailing costs of the newsletter.

NID PROGRESS REPORT

[Each month RNA will publish the projects that our Neighborhood Improvement District (NID) Managers, Ufredo Merchan and Billy Rodolfos are working on.]

BILLY RODOLFOS (North-7):

As I do every day, I escort the high school kids around the neighborhood and clean-up the streets and exterior of the catch basins. I also patrol the area to enforce any ordinance violations. I have patrolled Palisade and Ogden Avenues more lately due to a couple of complaints which I have received.

On February 18, 1997, in a joint effort between the NIDs of North-6, North-7 and North-9, Holland Street between Paterson Plank Road and Palisade Avenue was cleaned. We filled and removed 25 bags of garbage that had been dumped there.

The sidewalk and catch basins located in front of 130 Griffith Street and 102 South Street were repaired. Code Enforcement Officer (CEO) Carrol Pasquale had these repairs accomplished within two days. I will be introducing her at the next RNA meeting.

The NID managers have been sworn in and now have the power to issue summonses.

I had the street lights at the following locations repaired: 326, 418, 464 Central Avenue; 151 Cambridge Avenue; 272 Hancock Avenue; 278 Sherman Avenue; SE corner of Congress and New York Avenue.

UFREDO MERCHAN (North-6):

Ufredo held his first NID meeting at Harbor View, before the start of the regular RNA February session.

However, during the month, Ufredo was not able to be contacted, despite numerous messages left on his voice mail and beeper.

CALL YOUR NID MANAGERS and tell them about a problem or complaint in your neighborhood or a suggestion to improve it.

From Valerie's Kitchen:

Grilled Fajitas

("Simply the best fajitas you'll ever taste.")

INGREDIENTS:

- 4 chicken breasts (skinned and deboned)
- 1 cup Italian salad dressing
- 1 can (4 oz.) diced green chiles
- 8 flour tortillas
- 1/3 cup extra-sharp cheddar cheese, shredded
- 1/2 cup diced tomato
- 1 cup shredded lettuce
- hot sauce

- 1) Combine Italian salad dressing and green chiles.
- 2) Pour mixture over chicken breasts and marinate in a covered container for at least 6 hours in the refrigerator, turning occasionally.
- 3) Grill chicken breasts until done (5-7 minutes per side).
- 4) Slice across the grain, cutting the chicken into thin strips.
- 5) Assemble fajitas by placing a few pieces of chicken on a warmed flour tortilla.
- 6) Top with cheese, tomato and lettuce.
- 7) Cover filling with hot sauce and roll tortilla together.

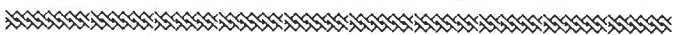

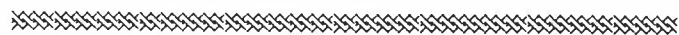

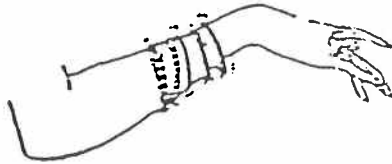
