MEETING MINUTES

Chairperson Maria Tuzzo opened the March 9th meeting of RNA in the Harbor View Health Center's cafeteria because the second floor meeting room was unavailable. First she reminded everyone present to pay their annual RNA dues of \$5.00, if they had not already done so. Second, she announced that Harbor View was holding its own flea market in April. She then informed the group that several council candidates in the upcoming municipal election had been invited to our next meeting. Finally, she introduced Thomas Berjgrowicz, the new administrator of Harbor View who briefly addressed our group.

After these announcements, the first order of business was a discussion of RNA's Ninth Annual Flea Market. The event will be held on Saturday, June 12th with a raindate of the following Saturday, June 19th. As usual, it will be held in Riverview-Fiske Park.

Suggestions were offered to improve this year's flea market, including: more donations for the RNA table, better enforcement of the one free cup of coffee for vendors, better security at the food table, and softer rolls for the meatball sandwiches. One of the more serious problems is still keeping the Park clean during and after the event. Vendors and customers leave garbage in the Park that must be disposed of by RNA.

On the subject of dropping off items for the RNA table, Dorothy Rosario offered her house as the drop-off location. Dorothy lives at 283 Ogden Avenue, which is the last house

on the Park's south side. She graciously offered to store items before the flea market and then carry them across the Park on the morning of the event.

Maria informed the group that representatives from the U.S. Post Office and the Hudson County Taxpayers Association are available to come to future meetings and meet with RNA.

The election for the annual RNA officers was held. By unanimous vote, RNA elected Ernie Quintero as Chair, Russell Pratt as Vice-chair, Suzanne Maroon as Secretary, and Jack Rea as Treasurer. The only contested race was between Mrs. Marie Tuzzo and Harry Siano for the position of Sargent-at-Arms.

Several issues came up in the New Business portion of the meeting. The first one was the neglect of property by absentee owners, specifically 169, 172, 173 and 175 Ogden Avenue. Maria Tuzzo suggested that RNA send a letter to these landlords telling them that their properties are not being properly maintained. If the problems persist, RNA can then contact the City authorities.

Another concern was the lights on the basketball court in Riverview-Fiske Park. After the blackout from the recent storm, the timer on the lights has not been working properly. The result is that the lights are on after 10 pm and the kids again playing ball to all hours of the morning.

RNA member Gert Bogdan told everyone that admission to the newly opened Liberty Science Center is on a pay-as-you-wish basis on the first Wednesday of each month after 1 pm. Maria announced the Multiple Sclerosis Super Cities Walk in Liberty State Park on March 28th.

Another report of possums on Ogden Avenue was reported - this time between Franklin and Ferry Streets.

RNA member Dorothy Rosario raised the possibility of creating a community garden in the empty lot at 255 Ogden Avenue. Margaret McCorry said she would try to find out who is in control of the property to get permission for the garden. Dorothy is looking for volunteers to help with this idea.

The next RNA meeting will be held on Tuesday, April 13th at the Harbor View Health Center at the corner of Ogden Avenue and Franklin Street.

A personal note: it has been a pleasure serving as RNA Secretary this past year. Best wishes and thanks to the outgoing officers. Congratulations and good luck to RNA's newly-elected leaders!

THE ETERNAL QUESTION: WHY DO PEOPLE DESTROY THEIR OWN NEIGHBORHOOD?

I am constantly amazed at the attitude some people display in the way they live in our neighborhood. They seem to think that they exist in a vacuum - without any regard for their neighbors or friends. They keep their properties in a constant state of disrepair and filth. Some of these people are homeowners, some are tenants, some are slumlords, and some are absentee owners.

The first group of people think they live in a third world country where there is no regular garbage pick-up. There is always garbage in front of their building (sometimes seven days a week). They do not have proper receptacles for this garbage and either put it out in open, plastic bags or just throw out the raw refuse. Some of these buildings do not have superintendents as required by law. I'm sure you have experienced the pleasure of walking on Palisade Avenue and stepping in or around garbage laying on the sidewalk. It is not only a mess but it is a health and safety problem.

One chronic offender of this garbage problem is the apartment building at 236-238 Palisade Avenue. This owner always piles the garbage on their Griffith Street sidewalk, preventing people from walking through. Next, the building at 274 Griffith Street has turned the dead-end at Griffith and Ogden to a private garbage dump. This refuse is then scattered into the adjoining playground in Riverview-Fiske Park.

The worst offender is a Raymond Murphy, the absentee owner of 385 Palisade Avenue. His tenants have been throwing garbage in front of their building for over two years without being stopped by the City. The Incinerator Authority has taken him to court several times. Unfortunately, the last time in court, the municipal judge decided to just slap his hand by reducing his fines and allowing him to pay it off in installments.

Compounding this garbage problem are the people who constantly dump their construction, auto repair or house garbage on the closed Mountain Road or over the Palisade cliff below the Park.

The second group of people are owners who keep their buildings rundown or else totally abandon them. This creates an invitation to break-ins and vandalism and the fear of arson.

One such owner, Richard Uhrig, owns 454 Palisade Avenue. His property includes an abandoned, unstable shack on the southern border of Riverview -

Fiske Park. RNA has been after the Building Department's Director Micheal Regan since 1991 to have this structure torn down. Not even the renovation of the Park last summer could stimulate the City to act on this problem. On the average of once every two months the Division of Property Conservation must reboard up the structure because of vandalism.

Another abandoned property is located at 234-236 Ogden Avenue. This property is owned by Norman Wilson under the name of Chemrik, Inc. and Maria Barretta. Since the neighborhood resisted his attempts to build a condo hi-rise on the lots over seven years ago, he has allowed the property to deteriorate by abandoning it. Again, Property Conservation is frequently called to resecure the property from break-ins and vandals.

The attempts of the City, through either the Incinerator Authority, Property Conservation or the Building Department has proved to be totally ineffective in addressing, let alone resolving these problems. The owners and their tenants have realized that they can do whatever they want because the City is incapable of enforcing its own sanitation and building regulations.

All this has terrible repercussions in the neighborhood. Once one person gets away with a violation, others follow suit. The overall appearance of the neighborhood suffers. Once a neighborhood looks seedy and decrepit, then nobody want to live here either as a tenant or an owner. The worst effect is that the value of the residential properties decrease. It is inevitability the beginning of a decline in the overall quality of life for a community.

All we ask is that people think about their actions. Put garbage out only on the night before a scheduled pick-up. It should only be put in containers or closed heavy-duty plastic bags. The same goes for maintainence of the properties. It is in the owners best interest to repair their buildings and not to let them deteriorate.

From the City, we ask that there be a greater vigilance to enforce the building codes and sanitation regulations. It will help insure the healthy life of the community and the well-being of its residents.

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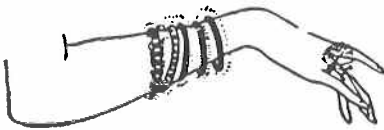
