MEETING MINUTES

At the April 13th meeting of RNA, several candidates for the upcoming municipal election discussed their platforms with the members. The following is a brief profile of each person, in the order in which they appeared:

L. Harvey Smith (council-at-large) is a crisis intervention teacher, drug counselor, academic advisor and lifelong citizen of Jersey City. As a member of Bret Schundler's ticket, he advocated the proposed Special Purpose Corporation (SPC) and additional community based police patrolling. He addressed the need for recreation and tutoring programs for the City's youth as well as the need for programs for our senior citizens. And while he did recognize the degeneration of the City as a whole, he also said "the blight factor in the Heights is not as bad as it elsewhere." His bottom line was to stop the downward trend and save Jersey City.

Bill Gaughan (Ward D) has been involved with Heights issues for over 30 years. He is also a member of the Schundler team. He emphasized Central Avenue and the two pieces of legislation that will help revitalize it: (1) the Special Improvement District and (2) the Urban Enterprise Zone. He discussed the importance of lower taxes via the proposed SPC. He also promised to look into the issue of the reopening Mountain Road. His goal was to follow in Tom Hart's footsteps and create a renaissance in the Heights.

Nancy Gaynor (Ward C) has been a teacher for twenty years. Her primary objectives are to get tough with the lawbreakers and troublemakers and get juvenile offenders to do community service. Although she was sympathetic to the plight of the neighborhood, she seemed unfamiliar with the recent battles the community has had with Christ Hospital

over their new parking lot built on the Palisades and their expansion policy in the Heights in general.

Tom DeGise (council-at-large) discussed the advances made since Mayor Schundler was elected. He stated that the issues are the same all over the City (including the Heights), and his goals are to: stabilize taxes, get more cops on the streets, create more jobs and improve the general fiscal situation. When another member raised the issue of Christ Hospital having the local zoning ordinances changed for them to 'legally' expand into the residential neighborhood, Tom acknowledged the importance of putting the proper people on the Board of Adjustment in order to avoid this problem.

Louis DeStefano (Ward D) is running as an independent candidate in Ward D. He is against Hudson County building an incinerator which would just exacerbate an already overwhelming pollution problem in our area. He is in favor of attrition layoffs and does not believe in hiring people just to fill budget spots. He stressed the importance of using city agencies, such as Public Works for City jobs instead of hiring outside contractors. He was very pessimistic about the City opening Mountain Road because of a lack of funds for infrastructure repairs. DeStefano assured everyone that despite his status as an independent, he would work with all the elected officials as long as they're above board and honest.

Jacqueline Shamberg (Ward D) is a college psychology professor. She was lured into politics because of her concern with the situation in the Heights, where she has lived all her life. A member of the Manzo ticket, she advocates more better trained police on the streets. She also stresses the importance of input from the community to help her do her job. She invited people to call her with any questions. Her motto was Visibility and Accessibility. Although she is the wife of the North District police captain, she did not think there would be any conflict of interest or partisan feelings in her voting decisions.

Louis Manzo is one of three candidates running for Mayor of Jersey City. Although all three candidates were invited, he was the only one to come to our meeting and speak to the members. He believes in trimming government by cutting spending. He recognizes the problem with property owners abandoning their responsibilities and not paying their taxes. However, he is against the SPC because in the long run, he believes that it will get the City into deeper financial trouble. He presented an alternative plan whereby troubled homeowners would be granted low interest loans from the Hudson County Affordable Housing Trust Fund. These loans would must be used to pay off the owner's current outstanding taxes. He also favors the issuance of mini-bonds to the residents of Jersey City that would enable current taxpayers to receive up to a \$300. rebate on their tax bill.

On the issue of crime, Manzo stresses the need for more community based policing, scooter patrols and assigned call zones for cops whereby they could interact with citizens and get direct feedback. He wants to establish a curfew and develop a youth conservation corp which would encompass education, recreation and

job training. He is also in favor of developing a recycling plant in Jersey City.

Anthony Cucci (council-at-large) as a former mayor of Jersey City, he feels he is uniquely qualified to help solve the City's problems. As a member of Manzo's ticket, he reiterated much of the above program. In particular, he addressed the issues of taxation and affordable housing.

As stated before, an invitation was extended to each of the mayoral candidates and their local ward candidates to participate in this forum. Although their members accepted the invitation, no one from the Waddleton team showed up at the meeting.

We didn't have the opportunity to get to the usual RNA business because of the time taken with this candidate forum. Hope to see everyone at our next meeting on May 11th in the Harbor View Health Care Center to discuss the upcoming flea market.

Jersey City with just about the largest senior citizen population in the United States also has the highest taxes of any city in the country. All the others which are much older will just be eliminated and they are the oldest in the state. Since most of our part time council members are school teachers, how could they let this happen? No wonder we have some four year high school students who can't read or write.

A Beautiful Easter Service

I thought of all my friends in the RNA when I attended a beautiful Easter Vigil Mass and how nice it would be to tell everyone about it. A friend invited me to this church in Port Newark, located near Newark Airport. Unfortunately, there was a terrible fire in Kearny that Saturday and it was an on-again, off-again routine as all the roads were closed in that area. Eventually we were notified that the roads were reopened and the mass would take place.

The parish is known as Stella Maris and Father Charles McTage is the parish priest. Years ago, Father McTage had a small chapel in the Seamen's Home for the sailors as their ships put into port and he was always

available to help them. Now he has his own church. Father McTage lives on the premises and he has all the facilities for keeping house. As one can see, this parish is built with loving hands.

Those who are able, bring some type of food. The food is accepted as soon as you enter the chapel and it is then placed on a large table in a room behind the altar. The table is set banquet style. After mass, everyone is invited to partake of all the goodies. Our donations were colored eggs and a babka. I noticed some of the congregation brought rice and beans and chicken.

The chapel holds about 150 people. The altar was decorated with beautiful plants. A young girl played a small organ in the back of the room. All the churches are decorated for Easter but this chapel was so quaint that I could not believe we were only twenty minutes from home. I felt that I was on one of the Carribean islands, or maybe Mexico or a small town in Italy. There were a few older people attending this mass but most of the parishioners were small families from the area. Like all children nowadays, the little ones were dressed with new sneakers.

Father McTage has been written up in the Jersey Journal (he speaks many languages) but it was something else to attend this mass.

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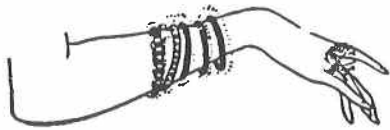

The municipal election in May could be a turning point for our neighborhood and our City. For the past four years, our community has been wrecked by official neglect, lack of services and a deteriorating crime and drug problem. Our council representatives were either ignorant of the problems or refused to work with our neighborhood to solve them.
