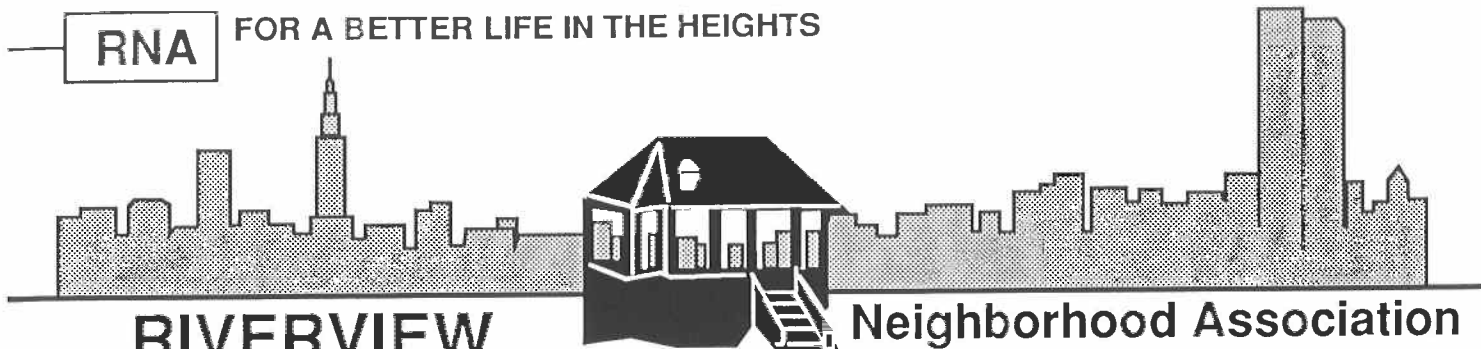

MEETING MINUTES

for September 10, 1996

COMMUNITY POLICE: Officers Scott Shnee and Lorenzo Tosado reported on the month's previous occurrences. They now patrol our neighborhood on SDS police bikes, and report increased speed and efficiency on their patrols. Disorderly groups at various locations in the neighborhood have been continuously warned and broken up. A warning was given to the plumbers supply shop, located off Bowers and Palisade, about letting their dog run loose in the Park.

The building at 454 Palisade Avenue is being rented out to new tenants, as opposed to the original report that the building was going to be boarded up and sold. There was concern that some of the same problems, such as drug dealing and pit bull dogs, might reappear if not watched.

The police were informed that the Gold Collision auto body shop on Griffith Street was reported as being open late into the evening with parking and doing repairs on the sidewalk. The police were also informed of a large hole in the fence at Bowers and Ogden, which is used by suspicious persons to travel to Holland Street and the Hoboken projects.

Louie Ramos, who caretakes the Moore Park on Cuneo Place, reported incidents of kids climbing the fences after the Park closes at 9 PM.

NID BUSINESS: Ufredo Merchan, our NID manager was on hand to discuss what he has done in our neighborhood and listen to problems.

Parks: Last month, Ufredo had traffic signs installed in our two Parks: Riverview-Fisk and Janet Moore. Unfortunately, he was advised of the poor placements of these signs in both Parks. He was already aware of the problem and will endeavor to relocate the signs.

He was also informed of a number of problems concerning our community gardens, including, the promised top soil which was never delivered and the inability to attach standard garden hoses to the nearby fire hydrant in order to water the garden plots.

RNA COMMUNITY GARDEN

This year the RNA gardens in Riverview-Fisk Park truly became a community garden. No longer just an RNA experiment, the garden is an accepted and valued part of the Palisade and Griffith neighborhood. Even though the idea was conceived by RNA, most of the people who use, help maintain, or just appreciate the garden aren't even aware that RNA exists. So our goal of positive community outreach beyond the membership of RNA has been met. In another neighborhood a community garden would be no big deal. But at this intersection it is vital, being almost the only positive activity that seems to be going on. The garden has had a beneficial effect on all but the most jaded here with just about every wild kid in the park getting caught up in it at some point. In general all the kids acted a little less crazy after working with plants and earth. We dealt with vandals this year by giving them trust and responsibility. Except for one kid this approach was entirely successful. Anyway, all kids act up.

We're learning as we go along and of course there were some mistakes this year. The most common complaint was no Wednesday night open garden meeting like we had last year. We wanted to see if people would organize and meet on their own without Clare or I but it just isn't ready for that yet. So next year we will again add a weeknight open garden meeting. Also the center garden was rather weedy and disorganized.

NID BUSINESS: (continued)

Dumpster Weekend and Garbage Containers: Ufredo will be coordinating a dumpster weekend with RNA, which will provide two city dumpsters in our neighborhood for any one to discard their large debris. Watch for the announcement of the dates and locations.

Ufredo is also working on the placement of additional garbage containers for our street corners. Members recommended the following locations: New York Avenue and Franklin Street, Griffith Street and Palisade Avenue and Franklin and Palisade (one for each corner of that intersection). He stated that the City is still choosing a functional design for the containers.

Potholes: The following locations were given to Ufredo to repair potholes: 427 Ogden, 443 Ogden and Hobson Street between Palisade and Ogden.

NID Manager: It was also noted that Ufredo's job and area of management is becoming quite difficult to manage effectively. However, it is imperative that the lines of communication are strengthened between Ufredo and the RNA.

Palisade Avenue Treescap Program: There was a discussion regarding the planned fall planting of trees on Palisade Avenue. The RNA 's program is being funded by a CDBG grant and is separate and distinct from the City's "Clean and Green Initiative". The RNA program will plant a tree in front of any property located on Palisade Avenue, located between Patterson Plank Road and Franklin Street FREE of CHARGE. All that is required is permission of the property owner. The City will plant a young tree and also install a tree guard and raindrain.

If any Palisade Avenue resident is interested in applying for this free planting, please come to the next RNA meeting or write to RNA, 232 Ogden Avenue.

At present, the grant only covers Palisade Avenue. However, if there is any money remaining, RNA will propose to include Ogden Avenue in this program.

PROPOSED FIRE STATION: The future of the vacant lot on the corner of Palisade Avenue and Congress Street - previously a gas station - was discussed. The Heights council representatives' proposal that this site be bought by the City and a state-of-the-art fire station be built was well received by the present membership. It was decided to found out the status of this proposal.

MOUNTAIN ROAD & HOLLAND STREET: John Mucha is the City engineer in charge of two local road renovations: Mountain Road and Holland Street. The Mountain Road project was temporarily delayed because of limited manpower in the Engineering Department. The

renovation design which should have been finalized this fall, will not be ready until the spring of 1997. He expected that a contract would be awarded and work would finally begin during the summer of 1997. The project is funded with a state grant of \$615,000.00.

There was no work being done on Holland Street, but Mucha expected that work would begin after Mountain Road was complete. The Holland Street renovation was being funded by a \$175,000.00 state grant.

DON'T DRINK THE WATER: Several members complained about the lack of information following the recent shut-down of the Jersey City water treatment plant in Boonton, New Jersey and the danger of drinking the untreated water for several days. It was decided to ask a representative from the City and United Water about this important problem. The question was why there was so little information given to the average resident about this health problem and what will be done in the future if this problem happens again to alert the citizenry.

**GOOD FRIENDS AND PARKING SPACES CAN
MAKE FOR STRANGE NEIGHBORS**

If a friend of RNA hadn't been sitting in on a City Council meeting last month, none of us on Ogden Avenue and no one at the Riverview Neighborhood Association would have heard the news. The City Council had passed a resolution to make the property from #178 to the end of the block a loading zone. This would, in effect, eliminate approximately ten parking spaces - spaces which are fast disappearing due to Christ Hospital's new clinic.

Fortunately, a copy of this resolution, which was vague about what hours and days would be involved, reached RNA. When called, the council person's office said they knew nothing about it, even though Nancy Gaynor is listed as having voted for it.

Our good neighbor, the Harbor View Health Care Facility initiated this restrictive resolution for their own convenience. Apparently, they were unhappy with the present system for making deliveries. This, despite their ample parking lot and wide entrance at #178 Ogden Avenue.

The new administrator from Harbor View was invited to attend the September RNA monthly meeting to discuss the member with the members. However, she did not attend the meeting.

The concern of the local residents is that this is an unnecessary elimination of street parking which is their primary source of parking for their family vehicles. It is assumed that this issue can be peacefully resolved between the Harbor View and RNA.

As a result of RNA's inquiry, the resolution to restrict parking by designating a new loading zone on Ogden "has been put on hold." However, if the residents do not continue to ask about it, this will certainly be implemented. Is this what you want?

We hoped someone would take on the small amount of work required to keep the center garden tidy, but it just didn't happen. With all the mulching that we did in the spring there is only about an hour of weeding needed per week for all the gardens in the park. I think that this opinion is racist and I'm happy to say that these losers are wrong. People are the same no matter what country they come from. The positive changes on the Avenue come in small increments, and RNA has the right to be proud of the improvements we have fought for and achieved. After all, we're not fighting a war, we are building a neighborhood.

Thanks to all who helped make the garden a success this year, including Dorothy and Yogi Rosario, and especially Louis Ramos for showing the whole neighborhood how to grow vegetables. Thanks also to Allison Fontana Ferrara for providing the beautiful park bench. And thanks to my partner Clare Archer: without her help and expertise this would not have been possible.

From Valerie's Kitchen:

Mrs. Eisenhower's Pumpkin Chiffon Pie

INGREDIENTS:

- 8 beaten egg yolks
- 3/4 cup brown sugar
- 1-1/2 cups cooked pumpkin
- 1 envelope plain gelatin
- 3 stiffly beaten egg whites
- 1/2 teaspoon ginger
- 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1/4 cup cold water
- 1/4 cup white sugar
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon salt

- 1) Combine egg yolks, brown sugar, pumpkin, milk, salt and spices.
- 2) Cook in double boiler until thick, stirring constantly.
- 3) Soak gelatin in cold water.
- 4) Stir into hot mixture.
- 5) Chill until partly set
- 6) Beat egg whites, add white sugar and beat stiff.
- 7) Fold into gelatin mixture.
- 8) Pour into pie shell and chill until set.
- 9) Garnish with whipped cream.

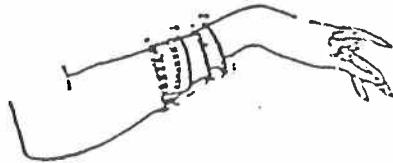

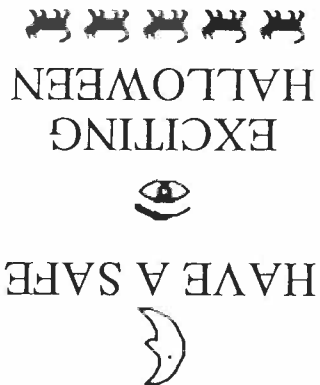
