LIVE SUMMER CONCERTS IN RIVERVIEW- FISK PARK

The Jersey City Department of Recreation and Cultural Affairs will represent two live concert events in Riverview-Fisk Park this summer.

Wednesday, July 1 at 6:00 PM, there will be a live music concert by **Deborah Ann Rivera.** She will perform original jazz and latin fusion music.

Thursday, August 6th at 7:00 PM, the **Hudson Shakespeare Company** will perform a production of the "Comedy of Errors."

Both events are free and will take place in the pavilion. We ask that you bring your own seating. We are in the process of closing the portion of Ogden Avenue running through the Park for these two events.

RNA is also working to schedule additional music events throughout the summer in the Park. If people are interested or have suggestions for these events, please come to our next meeting.



STATE HIGHWAY PROJECT

RNA has been invited to participate as a member of the local Project Advisory Committee (PAC) for the N.J. Department of Transportation's rehabilitation project of the State Highway from Palisade Avenue to Kennedy Blvd. The plan calls for the widening of the present roadway and construction of a larger air duct between the two lanes. The project will cost approximately \$140 million and will be performed in three separate phases starting in 1999 and going through 2002. It will be funded by the Federal Highway Administration.

The Sgt. Anthony Park Association, who has been instrumental in drawing attention to the traffic problems at the intersection of the Highway and Palisade Avenue, is concerned that the project has the potential of increasing pollution and traffic flow in the local neighborhood.

The first meeting is scheduled for June 10, 1998.



MEETING

MINUTES: MAY 12, 1998

HARBORVIEW HEALTH CARE FACILITY: Amy Montgomery as Director of Recreation is in charge of volunteers at the 180 bed senior facility located in our neighborhood on the corner of Ogden and Franklin. She asked for local people to volunteer and spend some quality time with the residents. She related the difference it can make in the lives of the residents to have neighbors come and visit with them. The time can be spent talking, reading or participating in any of the center's organized activities. She urged any person with the time and energy to befriend a senior.

RNA also suggested that we should organize joint ventures with the Center, such as inviting the seniors to spend the day at our June 6th flea market in the Park. For more information, call Amy Montgomery at 963-1800.

FLEA MARKET: Maria Tuzzo gave an update on our upcoming flea market. Joey George has secured a sound system for musical entertainment and announcements. Once again, Tony Scarpa from SDS Bicycle Shop on Palisade Avenue will donate 2 small bikes for our raffle. In addition, he will also be performing some of his magic during the day.

RNA is looking for donations for our own table, a case of bottled water and baked goods. We are also looking for someone to make balloons and face paint for the children. As usual we also need volunteers in the morning and late afternoon for clean-up. We also need a person to act as M.C. to announce the day's events. FINANCES: RNA Treasurer Carol Rebelowski gave a monthly report. At present we have two bank accounts, a business account and a Park account. The membership approved the payment of several bills, including \$104.50 for the printing of the March

newsletter and a cash advance of \$50.00 for the upcoming flea market.

An automatic stapler was donated by a new neighbor.

COMMUNITY POLICING: Sgt. Lissi gave the following updates in the monthly police report. A local stalker has finally been arrested and is presently incarcerated. There are plans to set-up a speed zone check point on Ogden Avenue between Griffith and Bowers through Riverview-Fisk Park. The 10:00 PM curfew for youngsters is being enforced. Because of their recent success in curtailing local burglaries, the NTF patrols will return to their usual afternoon to evening hour tours starting May 26th.

Officer Charles Laziere was introduced to the group as a new member of the NTF patrol. Sgt. Lissi also indicated that the North Precinct might be getting more officers with 26 new police cadets graduating from the police academy.

A request was made for our two local NTF officers, Tosado and Schnee to attend the June 6th flea market. Their participation last year made the event a great success.

There was another request for the police to keep the cliffside homeless settlement between Paterson Plank Road and the Conrail embankment in check.

An Ogden resident asked the police to talk to one of her neighbors to park their vans on their own property instead of taking up valuable street parking.

SUMMER ACTIVITIES: Joan Earls is the Director of Department of Recreation and Cultural Affairs. She is also a long time local resident, good neighbor and RNA member. At the meeting, she announced and distributed pamphlets for the upcoming recreation programs scheduled for the neighborhood parks throughout Jersey City.

The recreation program for Riverview-Fisk Park will be from Monday to Friday, 4:30 to 9:00. It will run from May to September.

Jose Fontanez will be the on-site coordinator again this year. The sports program will start with three coaches and an additional person to supervise games for the younger children. An extra person is available if warranted.

Our Park Attendant asked whether Ogden Avenue running through the Park could be closed during the summer as was the case many years ago. Joan responded that closing the street would be inconvenient for residents and dangerous without someone to redirect the local traffic. However, she said she would be willing to discuss the possibility of closing the street for several hours one or two times a week on an experimental basis. Kevin Sluka, the Director of Public works said he would help to coordinate it if requested.

WARD C COUNCILPERSON Arnold Bettinger was an unexpected but welcome guest at our meeting. He has been walking his district on a weekly basis with NTF officers and the NID addressing problems and meeting with constituents. New construction projects in the ward include a court building on Summit and Newkirk,

a senior housing complex and day care center on Baldwin and County Road and a hotel on Journal square has been bought for conversion for residential rentals.

To expedite problem areas, Bettinger with his aide **Jim King**, has been working with the Incinerator Authority to clean up local sites and then charging the expense to the owners. There were 373 drug arrests in a 36 day period; of which one half have been out of town buyers. A \$1,000.00 fine has been imposed on these individuals to discourage repeat offenses.

Bettinger also reported on a meeting concerning the over proliferation of jitney vans in our area. Captain Meyers has set up roving patrols to issue motor vehicle violatons to offending drivers on Palisade Avenue and Kennedy Blvd. The State has also been contacted on this issue because the vans are state licensed.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS Director **Kevin Sluka** announced the following projects in our neighborhood.

1. **Janet Moore Park** (at the corner of Ogden and Cuneo): The City will install a cyclone fencing along two sides of the existing fence to prevent vandalism and entry into the Park after it is closed in the evenings. Tree guards will be installed around the trees bordering the Park and chicken wire will be used to protect the trees inside the Park. A area of the Park will be designated as a garden and closed off with a picket fence. Sod will be planted in the triangular sections and the existing hostas plants will be transplanted to this garden area.

2. **Palisade Treescape Program**: The second phase of this program will begin this week with the planting of 31 trees and 36 rails and gratings installed. The City will plant kwanzan cherry, which is a flowering, non-fruit bearing tree.

[It appears that there will be a surplus from the original \$50,000.00 grant for this program. RNA will begin discussions with the membership to decide how best to utilize this money for our community. Initial suggestions include a community bulletin board in the Park and tree plantings on the side streets.]

3. **Woods Place**: The City will remove the southern sidewalk on this street located between Palisade and Ogden to accomodate additional parking.

4) **Bowers Street**: The faded yellow line divider on Bowers between Ogden and Palisade will be repainted for the busy two-way traffic. A request was made to install two stop signs at the intersection of Bowers and Ogden.

5) **Street Repaving**: Palisade Avenue will be repaved by the end of this year. Requests were put in to repave Hobson and Ferry Streets between Palisade and Ogden.

6. **New York Avenue**: Kevin announced the following repairs scheduled for this cliff road. The replacement for the missing highway barrier has been delivered and will be installed shortly. The repair of the roadside fencing will be put into next year's budget. [PSEG will schedule the repair of the overhead street lights within the month.]

7. **Bus Stop**: Kevin was asked to look into the long overdue installation of the bus stop for the

southbound lane of Palisade Avenue at Griffith Street. A request was made to replace the stop sign at Ogden and Franklin.

8. **Riverview-Fisk Park**: The play surface in the children's playground will be repaired this summer. Additional tubular steel fencing will be installed to completely enclose the playground. The City has commissioned a \$50,000.00 study to inspect the integrity of the cliff retaining wall before any renovations can be started on the eastern side of the Park.

9. **Adopt-a-lot**: The City has started a new program where it will issue a \$250.00 grant to neighborhood groups to clean-up and maintain vacant City-owned lots.

The comment was recorded in the RNA Meeting Minutes published in our April 1998 newsletter. As previously stated, RNA welcomes Mr. Sheridan's comments and invites him to any future meeting to discuss our concerns with the responsive of City agencies to local neighborhood complaints.]

I see that my letter was printed in the RNA newsletter.

I read your statement that "the community is struggling or frustrated in our attempts to get the City to respond in an effective and efficient manner to chronic problems of code enforcement, abandoned housing, sanitation, crime, etc." I suggest that you or the constituents who have these problems call our office and inquire how we can help them. If you feel you have in the past, then I will need specifics because I do not know when we have not tried to help the RNA.

If you hold me responsible for problems that you are having with the departments in the City but have not shared them with myself or Maureen Corcoran, Constituent Services Representative for the North district, this would not be appropriate. Mayor Schundler and myself have met with residents of the RNA area on numerous occasions at Mayor Schundler's "Open Door" sessions. I have come to your neighborhood with Mrs. Corcoran on numerous occasions as well as attended RNA meetings. I do not know anytime we have not tried to help.

To assume that their is any animosity or some type of problem is wrong. I am offended that you would print [hear say] remarks without first inquiring or qualifying such a statement. The sentence of my last letter the word "retraction" was misprinted as "reaction". I still await a retraction.

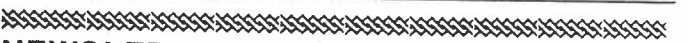

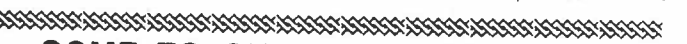
