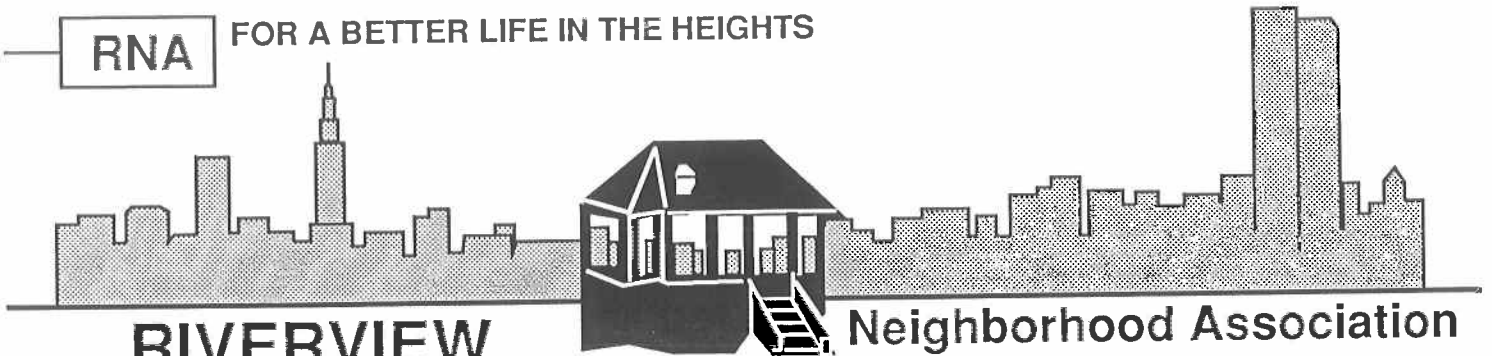

## ESTABLISHING RNA COMMITTEES

At the February meeting, the membership agreed to reactivate six standing committees in order to monitor important concerns in our community. Members volunteered to participate in the following committees: Planning & Development, Traffic & Transportation, Crime, Sanitation Parks and Activities. Each committee will make reports at the monthly meetings and through articles in the newsletter. On February 22nd and 24th, initial meetings were held for each committee.

**Planning & Development:** Steven Carr and Stu Robinson decided to get a copy of the current zoning regulations and compile a list of the key players including City officials and Board members for future reference. It was decided that the committee would oversee the Holland Street renovation and the proposed Palisade Avenue Redevelopment Plan. All residents are asked to inform RNA of any pending construction projects in their neighborhood when they receive a notice of an upcoming Zoning or Planning Board meeting. [An article about a current construction project on Ogden is included in the COMMUNITYUPDATE column.]

**Traffic & Transportation:** Beth Derrico, Steven Carr and Thomas Neiman started to compile a list of issues, including jitney buses, illegal parking on Palisade Avenue, bus courtesy, permit parking, parking meters and the proposed roadway for the Bergen Arches.

**Parks:** Marshall Williams, Beth Derrico, John McCarthy and Allison Fontana discussed the need for imaginative, educational and yet fun signs in Riverview-Fisk Park for the children's playground and the dog littering problem. It was also suggested that several locations be designated for the placement of free doggie bags to encourage owners to pick up after their pets. This committee will also organize activities in the Park throughout the summer months.

**Activities:** Valerie Rea, Jack Rea and Maria Tuzzo discussed the inauguration of visits - possibly the fourth Sunday of each month - to the residents of the Harbor View Health Care Facility by volunteers from the local neighborhood. The visits would include reading, talking and spending time with the residents as well as organized entertainment. The committee also agreed to organize an Easter food and clothing drive. [A separate article on the upcoming flea market is on page two.]

**Sanitation:** Jerry Brooks and Kevin Mahoney. It was

RNA will also invite the Palisade Avenue Merchant's Ass'n to co-sponsor the event.

Community and municipal agencies such as the Hudson County Animal League, the Police Department and the Incinerator Authority will also be asked to participate.

The flea market serves as a fundraiser for RNA's many activities, including the publication of this newsletter. This all-day activity held outdoors in Riverview-Fisk Park is a great way to meet your neighbors and make new friends. As usual, we need many volunteers to make this year's event a great success.

### MEETING MINUTES: FEBRUARY 9, 1999

#### COMMUNITY POLICING:

NTF Officers Paul Weidmueller and Barbara Peretti discussed the following concerns:

a) In January, the police confiscated five unregistered vehicles with fictitious license plates parked outside the **Griffith Street Body shop**. The police will monitor this facility to ensure its compliance with state and municipal regulations, including street parking, and blocking pedestrian and vehicular access. Tony Scarpa of the newly formed Palisade Avenue Merchant's Ass'n offered to invite the garage managers to its next meeting to discuss these problems with the neighbors.

b) The police have not responded to late night complaints concerning loitering and noise on Palisade Avenue. The problem was reported to the North Pct. desk but it appears that nothing was done to address them. It was recommended that Captain Wolleon be notified for follow-up.

c) An Ogden Avenue resident complained about an auto alarm that sounded for over two hours. It

decided to organize the spring clean-up and dumpster weekend for either April 24th or May 1st. A final choice will be made at the March 9th meeting as well as deciding what special activity the community should participate in. In addition, specific problems such as dog littering and problem buildings were discussed, as well as methods of educating the residents, such as a flyer or poster campaign.

Crime Committee: Len Davis and Jerry Brooks decided to start going to the monthly Community Relations meetings held at the North Precinct. It was also decided to start working now with the police on specific problems that reoccur every summer, such as the annual July 4th celebration in the Park and the misuse of water hydrants in the streets. The committee agreed to bring the issue of whether the basketball courts in the Park should be closed after ten at night to the general membership for discussion.

In addition, it was decided to gather statistics about what the local residents consider the most pressing problems in the neighborhood. To that end the following list of problems and illegal activities was created for each resident to fill out. Once completed, the list should be either mailed to 232 Ogden Avenue or brought to the next meeting. The results will then be compiled and submitted to the police and the City for evaluation.

was recommended that the police be contacted because they will disconnect a faulty alarm after one half hour.

#### FLEA MARKET:

There was a brief discussion about the upcoming RNA annual outdoor flea market in Riverview-Fisk Park. Dates will be announced next month. [See the article on the flea market at the top of this page.]

#### COMMITTEES:

There was a discussion about the establishing of the following committees: Planning & Development, Transportation, Crime, Sanitation, Parks, Activities. [See the article about this project and the initial organizational meetings on page one.]

#### COUNCILMAN BETTINGER:

**Ward C representative Arnold Bettinger**, was an unexpected but welcome guest speaker. He mentioned that he had organized a sting operation against illegal jitney buses in Journal Square about a year ago. He believes that there must be better regulation on the municipal, state and federal levels to bring much needed relief to the City.

He announced that the federal Bureau of the Census is looking for full and part time workers for the upcoming U. S. Census in the year 2000. The telephone number for more information is **1-888-325-7733**.

He stated that on January 23rd, he and several other officials accompanied Maria Tuzzo on a Saturday morning inspection of certain local streets (Ferry Street and Woods Place) that are in need of weekly street cleaning. The tour also included New York Avenue which is in need of a large scale cleaning of all the debris dumped on both sides of the road from the local properties above. [See Community Update for JCIA clean-up.]

Mr. Bettinger read the December, 1998 crime statistics in our community: 107 arrests, 1136 summons issued and 57 ordinance violations issued.] He estimated that there will be a \$1-3 per thousand tax increase when the City budget is finally approved.

He described his lobbying effort to have the City purchase the former State Theatre land in Journal Square for additional parking and retail space. In addition, he discussed the proposal of a SID (Special Improvement District) or a UEZ (Urban Enterprise Zone) in the Journal Square area. He also favors putting a community center in Journal Square and solicited suggestions for how the facility could be utilized by the community.

#### Palisade Avenue Merchants Association:

**Tony Scarpa** invited local residents to the Ass'n meetings which take place on the second Monday of each month at The Family Fun Center, located at 401 Palisade Avenue and the corner of Hutton Street.

The goal of this new group of business people is to improve Palisade Avenue and to stimulate business. It was recommended that RNA send a liaison to the meetings, coordinate activities between the two groups and invite them to write a column for the newsletter.

## COMMUNITY UPDATE :

**Bergen Arches:** On February 5th, RNA attended a meeting held by the **Hudson Alliance for Rational Transportation (HALT)** to solicit support for its proposal to reinstitute a railway freight line in this roadway with a light rail spur instead of the current plans to turn it into a four lane highway. A member of Halt will be invited as a guest speaker in the near future to discuss this important transportation issue for our community.

**346-352 Ogden Avenue Development:** On February 9th, adjacent residents and RNA members attended a Planning Board meeting to voice their concerns regarding the development of 346-352 Ogden Avenue (the vacant lots on Ogden Avenue's east side between South and Bower Streets). **Fernando Francisco** of Cedar Grove, the owner of these lots, has proposed the construction of three two-family houses on the site. To do this he applied for a re-subdivision of the four existing lots into three in order to "... meet area and frontage requirements for the purpose of creating more nearly conforming individual building lots. ..." He also applied for a hardship variance because of the undersize of the newly created lots due to the cliff slope.

The preliminary blue prints submitted to the Planning Office raised numerous concerns of the neighborhood. First and foremost was that the houses conform to the R-2 (two family residential) zoning of the area. The plans called for a full bathroom and third separate heating/hot water supply attached to a large family room on the ground floor of each building. With such accommodations installed at the time of construction, eventual conversion of this floor into a separate illegal apartment, thus making them three-family houses, could be easily undertaken after the Certificate of Occupancy was granted by the City. The elimination of available street parking, as well as the aesthetics of the building design were among other concerns raised by the neighbors.

Prior to the commencement of the Board's meeting, the neighbors met with the developer's attorney **Jon Campbell** and the architect **Allen Feld** to discuss these concerns. Mr. Campbell agreed to the elimination of the extra bathroom and heat and hot water supply on the ground floor. Mr. Feld presented us preliminary facade drawings that were quite in keeping with the context of the neighborhood's historic and architectural flavor. The developer agreed to flip, from left to right, the floor plan of the southern most building in order to create an additional on-street parking space. The development of a landscaping plan, however limited that may be, was also agreed to.

Mr. Campbell agreed to stipulate to these changes and submitted them to the Board as conditions that would be met in order to obtain the Board's approval. Vito Brunetti of RNA addressed the Board in order to reiterate the neighborhood position and submit into the public record those points which the developer's representatives agreed to.

However, the Board Chair Sheehan bluntly pointed out that the Board's approval would not be conditioned by the agreed upon stipulations and that

enforcement of these are not within the Board's jurisdiction. But the fact remains that the submission by the developer's attorney and RNA of these stipulated conditions into the public record will greatly aid the neighbors if necessary to hold Mr. Francisco to this agreement.

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**Palisade Avenue Redevelopment Proposal:** On February 18th, representatives of Palisade Avenue Merchant's Ass'n and RNA met with Councilpeople **Tom DeGise**, **Bill Gaughan** and **Arnold Bettinger** and Planning Director **Bob Cotter** to discuss the specific boundaries for the proposed redevelopment plan for Palisade Avenue. Suggestions were made to extend the area from Congress Street in the north to Prospect Street in the south. The Planning Department will now submit a resolution authorizing a study by outside consultants for this proposal to the City Council.

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**Jersey City Master Plan Revision:** On February 23rd, representatives of Sgt. Anthony Park Association, Palisade Avenue Merchant's Ass'n and RNA met with Planning Director **Jerry Killeen** and outside consultants **Anish Kumar** and **Richard Bartholomew** of Wallace Roberts & Todd, to discuss the concerns of residents and businesses within the eastern slope of the Heights regarding development, housing, commerce, education, transportation, recreation, environment and historic preservation. This collection of data and research is the first step in the City's proposed revision of its Zoning Master Plan. This plan will project the future development and also the maintenance and stabilization of the City's many districts, neighborhoods and communities. The Plan will be used as a blueprint to update the zoning ordinance in order to reflect the actual uses of each section of the City. There will be future ward meetings scheduled for local input.

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**New York Avenue:** The **Jersey City Incinerator Authority** started the long overdue clean-up of the cliff slopes along the New York Avenue extension during the week of February 22nd. The two-way road is being temporarily closed each day between 9 AM and 3 PM. This area is littered with thrown out residential garbage and dumped debris. Once cleaned, Public Works will reinstall fencing and highway barriers to prevent illegal dumping. RNA suggested the use of bituminous treated stone slope protection along the road edge to prevent vegetation growth.

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**Department of Public Works:** On Monday February 22nd, RNA met with Director **Kevin Sluka** and his Division chiefs, **Rodney Hadley** of Parks and **Joe DeSouza** of Traffic Engineering, to discuss several springtime projects for Riverview-Fisk Park including:

a) confirmation that the installation of new wrought iron fence on the retaining wall will include filling in the holes along the wall extending to Bower Street;

b) the repair of the benches on the eastern slope of the Park;

c) a request to install overhead lighting in the pavilion;

d) the installation of a new fence around the community garden with money from the Palisade Treescape Program;

e) the purchase of bulletin boards for both Riverview-Fisk and Janet Moore Park; and

f) the possible installation of a bus stop shelter at Palisade and Bower.

Several projects were also discussed for Moore Park including reseeding the grass, planting of boxwood or similar plants along the outside perimeter, new ground cover and fencing to protect the rose bushes.

Traffic Engineering confirmed that the ordinance to change the direction for Ogden between South and Bower was going to be introduced for its first reading on February 24th. The ordinance for Bower Street would soon follow. The installation of a bus stop on the west side of the intersection of Palisade and Griffith Street was okayed by the State.



## DO WE NEED PERMIT PARKING?

This is the second month that RNA is soliciting comments and opinions about the establishment of permit parking in our community. There have been numerous complaints about out-of-town commuters who park on our streets in order to avoid parking lot or garage fees. These out-of-towners then use public transportation to get to their jobs in New York City.

Permit parking would limit the use of our street parking because non-residents could only park in the area for two hours. After that, they would be subject to a parking summons issued by the City. A resident would be eligible for a parking permit costing \$5 dollars a year. Kindly address your comments to RNA. All information received will be organized and forwarded to the local Councilman for review.

## From Valerie's Kitchen:

### Homemade Cream Puffs

(a Gert Bogden recipe)

#### INGREDIENTS:

- 1 cup water
- 1 stick margarine or butter
- 1 cup flour
- 4 eggs

- 1) In a 3 or 4 Quart saucepan, melt margarine in 1 cup of water. Then stir in 1 cup of flour until it makes a ball. Remove from stove and cool.
- 2) Add eggs, stirring one at a time.
- 3) Place tablespoon-size portions of dough on a greased cookie sheet.
- 4) Bake at 425 degrees for 20 minutes. Then turn down to 325 and bake for another 25 minutes. Cool.

#### FILLING:

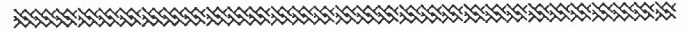
- 1 box instant vanilla pudding
- 1/2 pint heavy cream
- 3/4 to 1 cup milk

- 1) Combine ingredients and beat until smooth. Then refrigerate.
- 2) Cut tops off of puff pastry and fill with cream. Replace top of pastry.
- 3) Refrigerate. Add powdered sugar before serving.
