## COMMUNITYUPDATES

*[Since the April RNA meeting, there have been no updates regarding the status of the Cliff Side, Jehovah's Witness or the Hope Center projects.]*

**NJT LIGHT RAIL STATION:** During this past month, there was much public activity, regarding **New Jersey Transit (NJT)**'s plans for their Light Rail stations to be built along Hoboken's western border at Second Street and Ninth Street. On **Monday, April 8th**, NJT made a presentation to the **Hoboken Environmental Committee** of their plans to a well attended meeting made up of residents from both Hoboken and the Heights community, including members of RNA. NJT presented their design changes to the tower, bridge and headhouse that will connect the Ninth Street station to our community at Congress Street and Paterson Plank Road. The architectural design and color of the building materials

was an improvement from the initial proposal made to RNA on January 14th by NJT and the **21st Century Construction Company** (21st Century). Of particular concern were the details of the road improvements for the Second Street station which included the widening of Paterson Plank Road to a five lane highway in the area of the intersection with the existing railroad crossing, Mountain Road and Marshall Street

On **Wednesday, April 10th, Jersey City's City Council** voted overwhelmingly to deny NJT's permission for a temporary easement to begin construction of the Ninth Street Station. The Council cited various concerns, such as the lack of proper notice and consultation with the City and

## RAT CONTROL ALERT!

Because of the current construction below the Palisade cliffs from both New Jersey Transit's (NJT) Light Rail stations and the Gateway project at 101 Marshall Street in Hoboken, Heights residents have discovered the presence of rodents in our neighborhood. Last year, rodents were also noticed in the area of Ogden Avenue and Cuneo Place because of NJT's underground PATH tunnel renovation along New York Ave.

At the May 1st meeting with NJT, officials promised to baste the cliff and the dirt Mountain Road behind Ogden Avenue to prevent further infestation. Councilman Steve Lipski announced a meeting in mid May to address these problems. (Flyers will be delivered door to door announcing the time and place for this meeting.)

RNA has contacted the **Division of Urban Rodent Control** of the City's Department of Human Resources for information to disseminate to the community. The following suggestions are recommended:

- 1) Keep food stored safely in the refrigerator or cupboards.
- 2) Keep garbage in tightly covered cans.
- 3) Keep yards, basements and halls clean and free of trash and garbage.
- 4) Get rid of abandoned cars.
- 5) Caution: When poison, baits and traps are necessary, use them safely and wisely.

The **New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection** (NJDEP) has given the **Liberty State Park Development Corporation** (DevCorp) until June 2, 2002 to show why it shouldn't be terminated. In his recent "default of contract" notice, **NJDEP Commissioner Bradley Campbell** cited financial mismanagement as found in an Office of Audit review, including the under collection of \$833,328 in leasing fees alone!; and he concluded, "it is clear the direction of the DevCorp does not coincide with the mission of LSP."

The DevCorp, the source of endless battles against the public, has now hired lobbyists and lawyers to prevent its termination. Support the NJDEP, which has boldly initiated the welcomed action of getting rid of the arrogant DevCorp. The public's help is urgently needed to put democracy into action for the future of a free People's Park.

## MEETING

### MINUTES: **Tuesday, April 9, 2002**

The meeting opened by **Chair Cliff Steinbring** and the new Executive Board. Our first guest speaker was **Bob Hurley**, Director of Recreation, who outlined the many recreational activities he is setting up throughout the City for the summer months.

First, he announced the reopening of the Camp Liberty day camp in Liberty State Park with facilities for swimming, softball, volleyball and basketball. He also stated that the camp could be used for private events, with the city providing lifeguards.

The local facilities for recreation in the Heights and Journal Square, includes School #6, Pershing Field and the Jersey City Armory. Washington Park will not be available for city activities because it is a county facility.

Hurley then discussed the initiation of a variety of sports clinics for boys and girls, starting at the grammar school level, in Riverview-Fisk Park for this season. All the programs in the Park would be limited to children, teenagers and young adults between the ages of 8 to 18 years of age. He also stated that he would insist on residency requirements for all participants and background checks for all employees. He also suggested the hiring of a neighborhood person for the supervisor position of the basketball league.

Hurley also suggested solutions to two problems in our Park. First, he recommended the installation of locked gates for the two entrances of the basketball court to limit the use of the court between 10 AM and 10 PM. He also suggested the designation of another area of the Park for active sports to prevent the destruction of the passive lawns that occurred last year.

The second speaker was **Ron Clemente**, NID represen-

tative, who was finally back on the job after a long recovery from a job-related accident. Ron announced that since the NID was presently reduced to 8 employees, it was almost impossible for them to monitor the entire City. His own area was increased to Ogden and Palisade from Griffith to Prospect Street. **Anna Rose Smith**, the other NID manager, was assigned to the north ogden area. However, he recommended that if there is a quality of life problem, a formal complaint should be made to their office and appropriate action would be taken. After that, there was a discussion about the several development projects contemplated for our community and nearby Hoboken. Then the topic of the Light Rail stations planned for Second and Ninth Street in Hoboken was raised and their potential effect on our community. **Police Officers Alsina and Timmons** gave an update of the crime fighting efforts in our community. There was a recent drug operation on Franklin Street that resulted in four arrests. Several weeks ago, the police confiscated 10 bags of dope in the Park. Members also made complaints about the following problems: two recent car break-ins in the Pohlman Hall parking lot and the occupation of an abandoned house at 50 South Street by unsavory individuals.

Finally, the preparations were discussed for two upcoming events: the Spring clean-up on April 27th and the Park Fair on June 1st. The membership approved the following expenditures: \$150.00 for food and refreshments for the clean-up, \$50.00 for the purchase of a large market umbrella and stand for the Park Fair and \$120.00 for the printing of the February 2002 newsletter. the Heights community regarding these two stations and the continuing problems to local residents of rat infestation, noise, dust and property damage caused by NJT's ongoing renovation of their Palisade underground PATH tunnel.

On **Wednesday, May 1st**, RNA met with 21st Century and a delegation of councilmembers, made up of **Bill Gaughan**, who coordinated the meeting, **Steve Lipski** and **Council President Harvey Smith**. There was another presentation of the revised plans for both stations. The subsequent discussion centered on the above mentioned concerns and also the critical issue of security for commuter safety. RNA members were skeptical of the validity of the project's traffic studies for both the Second and Ninth Street stations because it did not appear to take into account the new Gateway project at 101 Marshall Street in Hoboken or the Cliffside proposal for the old bookbindery in Jersey City. The fear that these projects will just exasperate the existing traffic congestion in this area was met with somewhat deaf ears.

RNA demanded that this and future projects should be included in a regional approach to transportation and development planning.

After a short caucus, RNA grudgingly decided to approve NJT's plans, feeling that the concessions were the best that could be gained at this time. It informed the Council that it would not oppose the reintroduction of the resolution for NJT's permits at the next meeting.

**GATEWAY PROJECT:** Although no official decisions were made regarding this project during the month of April, there was much activity among the individuals determined to stop the two 17-story towers project to be built at 101 Marshall Street in Hoboken. **Judge Arthur D'Italia** adjourned a second hearing till May 10th to allow the developers to continue negotiating with the **Tri-City Sewerage Authority** to rescind the denial of their sewerage permit.

Individuals from both Hoboken and the Heights community have continued to make public statements at the Hoboken City Council meetings requesting the City to stop this project. The community's opposition centers on the following issues: the additional burden the project would place on the existing traffic congestion in the area, the project's lack of adequate parking which will exacerbate the parking problem in both Hoboken and the Heights, the extreme size of the variances for both height and lot coverage, the lack of required notice to Jersey City, the Hoboken Housing Authority and Hudson County. In addition, the Heights community is opposed to this project because it will block the views of and from the Palisade cliffs and the urgent need for regional planning for all future projects in the densely populated area.

The two 17-story towers of the Gateway project will house 326 residential units, two restaurants, a 25,384 square foot health club, 5,240 square feet of retail space and an enclosed parking garage that will rise seven stories with 431 spaces. The towers would rise approximately 158 feet each - 100 feet beyond the normal zoning for that area and almost sixty feet beyond the cliffs themselves.

As this issue went to press, there was an initial meeting between residents of Hoboken and RNA regarding the current proposal to build four 13-story residential towers at 720 Monroe Street in Hoboken and the need to introduce zoning legislation to limit the heights of all new projects along Hoboken's western border to preserve the views of and from the Palisade cliffs.

**POLICE:** On April 16th, RNA sent a letter to **Captain Joseph Pizzalenti**, the North District Commander of the Jersey City Police Department regarding the problems in our community and specifically in Riverview-Fisk Park. A meeting with RNA's new executive Board was promptly scheduled to discuss these concerns. Local residents have recently noticed groups, or gangs, of ten to fifty young adults assembling in the Park, wandering back and forth across it, then breaking into smaller groups when leaving the Park. Although there is nothing wrong with this behavior, unfortunately the individuals involved are also fighting among themselves and others, causing vandalism in the Park and

in the adjacent streets and there is rampant evidence of drug use and sales among them.

Local residents are complaining of being intimidated to the point where they no longer feel safe using the Park. An example of the secondary effect of this problem occurred when potential buyers of a house near the Park canceled their contract when they saw one of the gangs fighting in the area. When property values fall, we will have deeper problems.

Another problem is the excessive drinking of alcohol and beer in the Park. If one takes a drive down Paterson Plank Road, you can see the effect of this drinking along the cliffside below the Park - a growing mound of Corona beer cases and bottles being thrown from the Park's lower walkway.

There is also a stepped up amount of drug related activity along the Franklin corridor from Mountain Road to New York or Webster Avenues and centering on Palisade Avenue.

The police were also notified about the three time vandalism of the traffic monitor that was installed on Ogden Avenue off of Bower Street by the City. (The Division of Traffic Engineering admitted that they would not attempt to install a fourth monitor under the current circumstances.) A request was also made to plan for appropriate police coverage for the annual July 4th celebrations in the Park. Finally, RNA requested continuous police presence, reinstatement of the bicycle patrols and the enforcement of the Park's curfew throughout the night.

Since that letter and meeting, the police have stepped up patrols and scheduled the parking of the Mobile Precinct in the Park. Residents have noticed that these efforts seem to be effective in curtailing some of anti-social activities.

**PARKS:** On April 22nd, RNA wrote a letter to Director Ron Buonocore of the Department of Public Works requesting a meeting and a walk through Riverview-Fisk Park to discuss a list of concerns that need to be addressed for the upcoming spring and summer seasons. The first request was for an immediate clean-up of the damage caused by the recent storm to the trees in the Park. It appears that four to six trees suffered such extensive damage that their complete removal and the planting of new trees will be necessary. Other improvements needed are: the resodding of the barren lawns, the repair of the vandalized bulletin board, the installation of a water line for the community garden, the installation of rumble lines on Ogden Avenue to slow the vehicular traffic through the park and the repair of the children's water fountain located in the Griffith Street lawn.

The letter also requested the DPW to investigate the installation of gates on the two entrances of the Park's basketball court to curtail playing after 10:00 PM. At RNA's April monthly meeting, Bob Hurley, Director of the Department of Recreation, made the suggestion and promised to coordinate the project between the City, the local police and our community. Under the plan, the gates would be locked at 10:00 pm and unlocked the following morning at 10:00 am.

Hoboken, where I grew up, was always a favorite with its many theaters. There was always so much to do along the waterfront piers where all the boats and ships were docked. You were never lonely coming home late at night with the many bars along River Street where you could always enjoy a drink.

People were always walking through the streets because of the many industries in town, such as Lipton Tea, Standard Brand, Tootsie Roll, Ferguson Propellers, Hostess Cup Cake, Wonder Bread to name a few - plus all the many coat companies. There were many beautiful stores along Washington Street where you could buy almost anything. The parks were always full of people and babies playing. And senior citizens just sitting, watching, reading or just passing the time. You knew everyone and everyone had a nickname. We had an uptown and a downtown. You even knew people that kept chickens and goats in their backyards.

First Street was a busy street and a favorite shopping area, with several coffee, grocery and clothing stores. Fifth Street was another street with mostly grocery, vegetable markets and butcher shops. We also had many horse and wagon merchants who sold all kinds of kitchen gadgets, pots, pans, and dishes. The fish wagon would only come around on Friday but the vegetable wagons would come around all week long, shouting out their products for all to hear. There was an oilman, iceman, egg man and anything else you needed. Dugan's came around to sell all kinds of cakes, pies, bread and butter.

Mr. Gordon would come around once a week, selling bedspreads, sheets, curtains and blankets. Many a bride's hope chest was started this way.

We would travel up the new Koven Road from Hoboken to Jersey City, which is now called Mountain Road. There was also a pedestrian staircase, known as the "100 Steps", which connected the two cities. I walked up and down those steps so many times and even in the wee hours of the morning. At the top of the hill, stood the Jersey City Garden or Grotto, as it was sometimes called. There were many dances and boxing matches held there. There was never a problem after the dances with noise or drinking. After the movies on Central Avenue, you could go to the ice cream parlors, like Meyers and Sol's to taste their delicious soft ice cream. They were favorite places to meet.

## SPRING CLEAN-UP

This year's neighborhood clean-up, took place on Saturday, April 27th, one week after a terrible storm devastated parts of Ogden Avenue and Riverview-Fisk Park. A stately, forty-foot oak tree, over 100 years old, was ripped from its roots and fell across Ogden, south of Griffith Street. Residents on the block were left without electricity, telephone and/or cable service for 24 to 48 hours. The Park lost at least four trees and its paths and street were littered with broken and mangled branches.

Armed with brooms, gloves, rakes and garbage bags, over forty adults and children joined forces to sweep, pick-up and rake the Park's interior. Holland Street was cleaned and even several bags of debris dumped on Mountain Road were picked up.
