NEW PLAN'S FOR JEHOVAH'S WITNESS BUILDING

Members of RNA and **Heights Hope** reviewed new plans for the **Jehovah's Witness** (JW) project being proposed for the corner of New York Avenue and South Street. The plans were formally submitted to the City on May 31, 2002. As we go to print, there is no specific date for the application to be presented to the Planning Board. However, here are some initial reactions after examining the revised plans.

JW is now requesting variances for building coverage, setbacks and landscaping. The proposed building would cover 65% of the lot even though the City's R-1 zoning requirement limits building coverage to 50%. The most excessive variances are for the setbacks of the front, side and rear yards to the property. JW propose only a 1 foot front yard whereas the City demands a 20 foot setback. The side and rear yard setbacks - although technically adhering to the footage requirements - are being in reality, being used for other purposes, including two driveways and parking of cars.

The project has attempted to solve their off-street parking problem by creating a parking lot under the building - a lot which will barely fit 24 compact automobiles.

Although there are certain changes to this latest proposal, the project is still too large for the location. There are still the

? Quick Fix Zoning ?

The possibility of the new zoning laws being amended seems to be in the works. It would have a huge impact not only on our immediate neighborhood, but all of the Heights and other long established neighborhoods. Our city spent an enormous amount of money for outside consultants, city staff time and resident's time to create a new Master Plan that was finally enacted last April into new zoning laws. Why the quick change to allow new residential construction with curb cuts, front yard parking, garages and buildings closer to the rear lot line?

Just a "quick fix" for the developers, at our expense !

STOP 101 MARSHALL

Have you wondered what's going on in that big plot of dirt located just as you take First Street off Paterson Plank Road eastbound, heading into Hoboken? You may find the answer disturbing...

Manhattan Builders has begun construction of a complex that consists of twin buildings, each 17 stories tall, known as "Gateway" or the "101 Marshall Street" project. These buildings will rise 158 feet, 4 inches when finished, nearly 60 feet higher than the Palisade Cliffs. Upon completion they will contain: 326 residential units; parking for 431 vehicles; 2 restaurants; a 25,584 square foot health club; and 5,240 square feet of retail space. They will consume the entire city block on which they're built.

How did the Heights community - and most of Hoboken - not know of this project until just recently? Virtually no one lives in the 200 foot radius surrounding the project that received zoning variance notices, so few people--even city officials--knew of the project until recently. The project has been around, in various forms, since 1998. It was originally a René Abreu project that he sold to Manhattan Builders in 2000.

Does the project have any public objection? Yes! We in the Heights have begun a petition against this and other proposed high-rise projects that will obstruct the Palisade Cliff line. We are protesting over-sized buildings, not development itself. We are urgently concerned about the impact this project will have on traffic, congestion, utilities, pollution, density, flooding and general quality of life matters for us here in the Heights. Has this complex been fully integrated with the Light Rail construction occurring next door? No one has seen a recent traffic study that incorporates the Light Rail, the related expansion of sections of Paterson Plank Road, 101 Marshall Street, and the proposed "Cliffside" project at what was the book bindery at 101 Paterson Plank Road (the brick structure that hugs the cliff at the base of Mountain Road).

We are trying to work with residents in Hoboken who are also opposed to the scale of this project and the questionable manner in which it was approved. Yes, that's the bad news: this project is approved and has all but its final above-ground permits. It just succeeded in obtaining sewage hook-up permission from the North Hudson Sewage Authority, after being denied due to concerns of the flooding that routinely occurs in the area.

Where's the hope in all this? We are appealing to Jersey City government to examine the impact of this project to the area we all share and review the notification process to Jersey City and its affected residents. A private suit is being considered as a possible means to get the project brought down in scale and height.

We are asking for help from all our concerned neighbors here in the Heights. We are optimistic that public pressure can sway public policy and change not only the direction of

this project, but all the planned projects along the path of the Light Rail.

Once these buildings are up, it's unlikely they will soon come down. Tell your neighbors. Contact our committee.

MEETING

MINUTES: Tuesday, May 14, 2002

The meeting opened at 7:45 Pm.

Police Officers Mike Reyes and Ed Rutkowski gave an update of police efforts in our community. Five warrants were served in Riverview-Fisk Park. The police also made numerous drug arrests, including one at 29 Franklin Street and four in the vicinity of Franklin and Palisade Avenue. Numerous summons were issued for parking and violation of various city ordinances.

There was a general consensus among the membership that despite the increased patrols in the Park, there was still a lot of negative activity in the Park caused by gangs of young adults. Several people also complained that when the Mobile Precinct was stationed in the Park, it was not being staffed with any officers and thus lost its value as a deterrent to criminal activity.

There was an announcement about several rat sightings along Ogden Avenue because of the current rail construction at the base of the cliffs. The **Division of Rodent Control** provided brochures and red plastic drinking cups to the membership.

The **Holland Street** clean-up and spring planting was announced for Saturday, May 18th. This year the committee was soliciting corporate donations to buy plants and other necessities for the cliff side gardens being cultivated along the road.

Ron Clemente of the Neighborhood Improvement District (NID) provided an update of his activities. He announced that Mountain Road is now scheduled to be cleaned twice a week, including street sweeping, street crews and emptying of garbage receptacles. The DPW is responsible for the picking of abandoned shopping carts in the neighborhood. At present, the Division of Animal Control is not picking up stray animals because their contract with the State

has expired.

He issued a summons to 262 Ogden Avenue because of backyard debris and overflowing garbage containers. He provided information to the new owners of 383 Ogden on the need for building permits for all renovations.

The next speaker was **Leon Yost** of the **Jersey City Landmarks Conservancy** who made an hour long slide presentation of various historic buildings and sites located throughout the Heights community. The slides depicted the buildings both in the past and what they looked like now. [See the article and catalogue of sites in the article following the Minutes.]

Next on the agenda, was a discussion regarding several high-rise projects in Hoboken that RNA has been monitoring. **Monya McCarty** announced that she has started a petition against the twin 17-story towers project, known as Gateway, which is currently being built on Marshall Street.

There was a status report on the upcoming Park Fair scheduled for Saturday, June 1st. People were asked to volunteer some time during that day to coordinate this event.

The meeting ended at 9:25 PM.

The Historic Heights Slide Show

The main guest speaker at RNA's May meeting was **Leon Yost** of the **Jersey City Landmarks Conservancy**. He entertained and also educated the membership with an hour long slide show depicting old and new images of the Heights community. His commentary was informative and fun.

It was a fascinating tour of our neighborhood, introducing historic buildings and sites that were unknown to the majority of the members. A special thanks to **Bob Leach**, of the **Jersey City Historical Project**, who co-sponsored the presentation.

The show included the following sites:

- 1) *Jersey City Garden*, 196 Ogden Avenue. Boxing every Tuesday night. Destroyed by fire in 1964.
- 2) *Koven Stove Works*, Paterson Plank Road & Mountain Road. Still standing.
- 3) *Wagon Elevator*, built 1875 and Trolley Trestle, built 1885. Down the Palisades at Ferry Street. The brick trestle footings are still there, under the brush on the cliffs near Pohlmann's Hall.
- 4) *Pohlmann's Hall*, 154 Ogden Avenue. The only site in the Heights listed on the State & National Registers of Historic Places.
- 5) *Public Service Trolley Power Station*, 324 Palisade Avenue. Now, Christ Hospital Annex.
- 6) *Public Service Headquarters*, 325 Palisade Avenue. Now, Jersey City municipal building.
- 7) *The cannon* in Riverview-Fisk Park.
- 8) *Trolley accident* at Palisade Avenue & Franklin Street, Midnight, May 31st, 1906, showing R. Schmidt's Grocery Store which was wrecked.
- 9) *Holland Street*, the last intact cobbled street in the Heights. Originally it was called Van Vorst Place.

- 10) *The Van Vorst House* on Palisade Avenue, the second oldest house in Jersey City, built 1740.
- 11) *The Newkirk House*, aka Summit House, 510 Summit Avenue, the oldest standing house in Jersey City, built in 1690.
- 12) *The Sip House* that once stood at Bergen Avenue and Newkirk Street, built in 1664, which was moved to Westfield NJ in the 1920s.
- 13) *Pathe silent-picture studio* which once stood at the southeast corner of Ogden Avenue & Congress Street. Mary Pickford filmed there.
- 14) *John M. Hughes House Moving Company*.
- 15) *Trains in the Erie Railroad's Bergen Arches* cut in 1909 and Pavonia Trolleys alongside.
- 16) *Construction of the Lackawanna Tunnel* and current renovation work.
- 17) *Early views of the Reservoir*.
- 18) *Franco American Food Company*, formerly on Central Avenue next to St. Nicholas Church.
- 19) *PS 7*, the oldest standing Public School building in Jersey City at Central Avenue & Congress Street.
- 20) *Interior views of Mt Sinai Synagogue*, 128 Sherman Avenue.
- 21) *Interior views of the Second Reformed Church* which contains the most elaborate stained glass windows in the Heights. Summit Avenue & Zabriskie Street.

COMMUNITYUPDATES

[Correction: In last month's article regarding New Jersey Transit's current renovations of their PATH systems, the Bergen Tunnels were incorrectly identified as the Palisade Path Tunnels. Ed.]

GATEWAY PROJECT: During May, the **Tri-City Sewerage Authority** rescinded their denial of the sewerage permit for this project after a settlement was reached with the developers. The next step is for the Department of Environmental Protection and the City of Hoboken to approve the settlement.

Residents of both Hoboken and Jersey City Heights are continuing to lobby Hoboken's City Council to file a lawsuit based on the project's history and irregular approval process.

Members of the Heights community are also organizing against this project in several ways. A petition drive has been initiated against the project. Plans are being made to meet with officials to discuss the fact that apparently neither the City of Jersey City or Hudson County was legally notified about the numerous hearings regarding this project.

Residents of both communities continue to meet and will shortly decide whether to file their own citizen's lawsuit against the City of Hoboken to stop this project.

The two 17-story towers of the Gateway project will house 326 residential units, two restaurants, a 25,384 square foot health club, 5,240 square feet of retail space and an enclosed

parking garage that will rise seven stories with 431 spaces. The towers would rise approximately 158 feet each - 100 feet beyond the normal zoning for that area and almost sixty feet beyond the cliffs themselves.

720 MONROE: Members of RNA and the Heights community have also been monitoring another hi-rise project in Hoboken in the Northwest Development Area. It is the renovation of the old Levolor factory complex that has been an artist residence and work space for many years. The proposal is to build four 13-story towers that will encompass an open space and commercial retail area. Hoboken residents are against this project because of its size. Heights residents are against the project, because as with the Gateway project, it will block the views from and of the historic Palisade cliffs. There is fear that it will set a terrible precedent for future hi-rise projects along Hoboken's western boundary.

RNA has begun working with Hoboken residents to lobby the City to pass "view plain" legislation to limit the height of future projects.

POLICE: During the month of May, RNA executives had two more meetings with **Captain Joseph Pizzalenti** and **Lieut. Robert Kilduf** regarding the problems in our community and specifically in Riverview-Fisk Park. Despite the stepped up patrols in and around the Park, there still was a lot of rowdy and unlawful activity. Because of the chronic nature of the problem, everyone, seeing any unlawful or even suspicious behavior, is being asked to take note of the individuals involved and, if possible the automobile license plate in order to make a report to the police. RNA is not advocating that anyone get involved but just get a description of the alleged perpetrators. *RNA is asking all concerned neighbors, friends and members to come to the June 11th meeting to discuss strategies to address this problem before the summer months.*

PARKS: During May, RNA executives and other community residents met with the Division of Parks (DP) in Riverview-Fisk Park to discuss a list of maintenance and improvement concerns that needed to be addressed for this season. As a result of the meeting, the following improvements have already occurred in the Park: 1) the long awaited water faucet has been installed in the Park's community garden and 2) the installation of three sets of rumple strips on Ogden Avenue between Griffith and Bowers Streets.

The DP has also promised to make the following improvements in two of the Park's lawns: lawn resodding and the installation of flower/shrubbery gardens. The gardens will be enclosed with wrought iron fencing similar to the other flower gardens in the Park and surrounded with benches. It is hoped that the installation of this type of improvement will deter the use of these lawns for soccer and volleyball tournaments which have turned the lawns in question into dust bowls. The DP will also cut the over-

grown tree and shrub growth along the Park's lower walkway from Bower Street to the pavilion.

Grassroots Mail is Urgently Needed - Urging Governor Not to Back Down and to Terminate Liberty State Park Development Corp.

New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection's Commissioner Bradley Campbell gave the **Liberty State Park Development Corporation** (DevCorp) until June 3 to show cause why it shouldn't be terminated due to its financial mismanagement and "its direction not coinciding with the park's mission." **Governor Jim McGreevey** is reported to be under heavy pressure from the DC's "power-broker" and political connections to prevent its termination. New Jerseyans have wasted enough years fighting their obscene commercial plans for our sacred and majestic park. Last July, a statewide coalition of leading environmental and civic organizations and the Communications Workers of America #1037, urged candidate McGreevey to pledge to oust the DC from the park.

The Governor has sent out a letter stating that he will make an announcement "in the summer." The **Friends of LSP** and the **LSP Conservancy** ask all believers in a free, and green urban oasis next to Lady Liberty, to please write to the Governor to help free the park once and for all from this public-be-damned private corporation which "violates the park's spirit"(The Record, 5/8) and must get it's "plug pulled" (The Jersey Journal, 5/13). "The group's name, the Development Corp., speaks volumes about the problem"(Asbury Park Press, 4/10).

Please urge the Gov.- not to back down and to end the state's contract with the DevCorp. Write Governor James E. McGreevey at P.O. Box 001, Trenton, NJ 08625, or go to his website's email form at www.state.nj.us/governor/govmail.html.

The Gov. can listen to the strong statewide voice of the People or be a collaborator with the park's internal enemy. New Jerseyans are watching.


