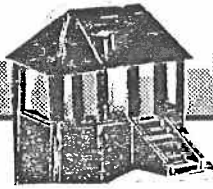

ON MOUNTAIN ROAD

At the February 12 meeting of the RNA, a forum was held regarding the future of the Mountain Road, which was closed last summer by the local government authorities for one year. On the forum were Jack James, Director of Public Works, Captain Orlando, Third Battalion Fire Department, Marie Murray, representing Councilman Tom Hart who was unable to attend; Captain Maglione from the North District Police Station and Armand Beard from the Heights Development Office. Mr. James described his part in the closing of the road as being ordered by the city council to close it due to negative uses of the road such as illegal dumping, abandonment of cars, delinquent behavior by negative people. He said that people in the community had complained about the road and the uses made of it and the local officials had responded by closing it. Marie Murray also added the information that the road was considered unsafe by Pat Nelan, Director of Traffic Engineering, and that if it is reopened, it can only be a one-way street. Captain Orlando reported that from the fire department's view, the closing of the road does not present a problem. He said that as long as there is no development on the road, the fire department does not need access to it in order to put out fires on Ogden Avenue or down in Hoboken. Ponte's was the only building down at the bottom of the road that had to be accessed, and there was not problem seen with that. (Note that the following weekend, Ponte's had a fire and the road was opened by the fire department).

Anne Hart spoke of the chronology of her efforts to get the road closed and her reasons. She cited dumping of trash and industrial waste, abandonment of cars, and the general negative uses of the road. Ms. Hart organized a petition in April of '84 to close the road and suggested it be made into an historic park. Her plan included lighting and benches and planting of flowers.

Mr. Frank Santoro, an Ogden Avenue resident for many years, spoke for the reopening of the road. Mr. Santoro has used the road for 60 years to get between Jersey City and Hoboken. He felt that if the road is plagued by problems, the problems should be resolved by other means than closing the road. He felt that it was not just a neighborhood issue, but an issue for many people who used the road to get access to

Hoboken and the Holland Tunnel. He felt that the local officials should find ways to stop the dumping and negative use of the road rather than close it.

The forum was organized because Mayor McCann said that if neighborhood residents can come to a consensus on what they want to happen with Mountain Road, he will go along with it. Open or closed. The forum was an attempt to get the history of the closing and the opinions of the people invited. Now the RNA will continue to do research on the various aspects of the subject (sanitation, safety, traffic, etc.) and continue discussing the issue with the goal of eventually voting on whether to keep the road closed or reopen it. The one year experimental closing will expire August 9, 1985.

GUACAMOLE DIP

(At Cathy's request)

- 1 can bean dip
- 1 smashed avocado
- 1 small container sour cream
- 1/2 package Taco seasoning mix (A&P has one with all natural ingredients)
- 1 small tomato (chopped)
- 2 scallions (chopped)
- Black olives
- 1 package grated cheddar cheese

In a shallow glass dish, layer the can of bean dip. Put one layer of the smashed avocado on top. Mix together sour cream and the Taco seasoning and layer on top of the avocado, followed by the chopped tomato, and scallions. Cut the olives in half and scatter on top. Finally, garnish with the cheddar cheese. Serve cold with corn chips.

FELINE LEUKEMIA PREVENTIVE VIRUS NOW AVAILABLE

Feline Leukemia, caused by a virus, is a life threatening disease that is most often fatal in cats. Dogs or people cannot catch it, but cats can infect each other through playing, groomig, licking and normal cat social behavior. It can also be spread through shared food dishes and litter boxes. Cats who go outside, go to kennels or groomers, or to the Vet's office are also susceptible. There is no cure for this disease, which is actually a collection of diseases, which include cancer of the liver, intestinal system, kidneys and other organs; kidney failure; severe anemia; cancer of white blood cells; lowered resistance to other diseases.

If your cat contracts this virus, death is pretty certain and no treatments are available. Vets often recommend that cats with this virus be put to sleep, as they suffer greatly until they die. There is still no cure, however, there is now available a feline leukemia virus vaccine which can be given to healthy cats nine weeks of age or older. A series of three vaccinations is suggested with a yearly booster. Remember, this vaccine cannot help your pet once the virus is contracted; nothing can, so have your cat(s) innoculated as a preventive measure. Ask your local vet if he has the vaccine. 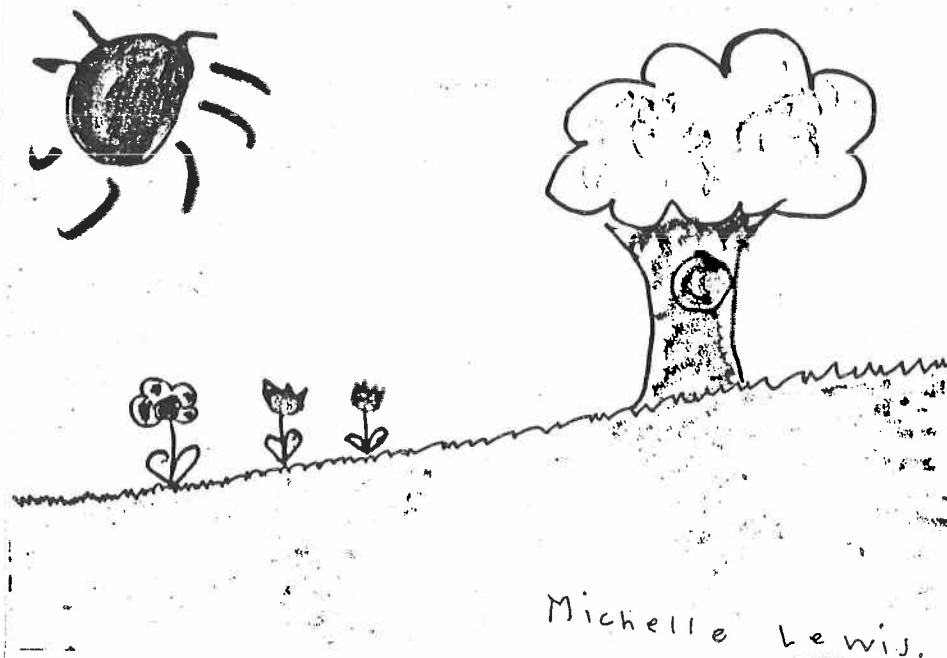
