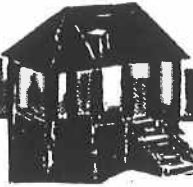

July's agenda was some old business, that of abandoned cars in our neighborhood, and the recurring summer problem of abuse of our local park. The result of our conference was the circulation of a petition that was presented to the Police Dept. with the hope of getting some real action to clean up the illegal activities taking place in the park.

Our August meeting revealed the results of the petition drive, a new proposal by the owners of the Pohlmann Hall property, and new ideas for community participation to keep our neighborhood as safe and crime free as possible.

Although sometime it may seem as though our efforts garner no gain, we are always rewarded to find that persistence does pay-off. A group of united neighbors can make a difference in an indifferent world. Why not join us at the next meeting, Tuesday, Sept. 8th,

FIRE ALERT

As we go to print, we sadly report that on Saturday, August 23, at approximately 4:00 a.m. there was a three alarm fire at 253 Ogden Avenue which spread to the houses at 251, 255 and 257 Ogden. The only casualty was a man named Eddie, who died in the fire and allegedly started the fire by smoking in bed. At-the-site information, yet to be confirmed, revealed that police never responded to a noisy party complaint at 253 Ogden. The complaint was phoned in by other tenants of 253, at 11:30 p.m. Friday evening and again at 2:00 a.m. Saturday morning. Also to be confirmed, was a report by neighbors that it took the Fire Department over 20 minutes to respond to the fire. The neighborhood people were amazing in their help and support for the families affected by the fire.



## Under the Chair

RNA has been very active this summer to preserve and improve our neighborhood. The following are two reports detailing our success in these endeavors.

**Pohlman Hall II:** One issue has been the continuing attempts to overdevelop the parking lot next to Pohlman Hall at 154-156 Ogden Avenue (Block 740, Lots A-1 and part of Lot B). On June 4th, a group of over thirty concerned residents opposed a plan by Investment Properties (Frank Latinas and Fred Resen) to build a 7-story, 42-unit condominium building with an underground garage on this site because they objected to the overwhelming height and density of the structure. The Board of Adjustment, after hearing nearly five hours of testimony, including a presentation from the residents with everything from maps and photographs to a scale model, voted unanimously against the project. RNA, realizing that the property should be developed, had proposed a compromise plan of five stories and approximately 20-units - which the developers refused repeatedly. Two proposals from the city's planning department (included in the developer's plan) to preserve the Palisades cliff portion of the property and to make a contribution to the city's affordable housing trust fund were supported by RNA. (Last year an earlier plan of these developers to build 24 townhouses literally on the Palisades cliff was also unanimously opposed by the residents and unanimously rejected by the Board of Adjustment.)

On August 6th, the developer once again came before the Board of

Adjustment to request a rehearing for a new application. The proposal now is for a 5-story, 20-unit condo with 47 parking spaces. (Sounds familiar, doesn't it?) The Board approved of the rehearing, which will probably take place sometime this fall. The specifics of this "new plan" are as follows:

1) height - the new structure will be 47' (the height of the eaves of Pohlman Hall),

2) density - there will be 20 condominium units (8 duplexes, 4 two-BR and 8 one-BR),

3) parking - there will be 47 spaces, 27 for the new building and 20 spaces for Pohlman Hall; parking will be in site in a street-level lot (eliminating the underground garage of the previous plan),

4) Fred Resen, the architect, has promised to design the main entrance on the streetline (eliminating the appearance of a building columns as in the previous plan),

5) the project will have the same "footprint" as the previous plan (it will not occupy a greater percentage of the land),

6) the commitment not to build on the Palisades cliff and keep it as a natural preserve, and

7) the zoning variances needed -  
a) use variance to allow a residential structure on an industrially-zoned property,

b) front yard setback to allow the building to be placed on on the streetline (as is Pohlman Hall and 164 Ogden Ave.), and

c) smaller parking spaces. Although RNA has officially reserved an opinion of this new plan, in a meeting with Fred Resen on Aug. 4th, we noted the incredible similarity of this plan to our original compromise in June. We plan to monitor this plan very closely and will keep our community informed on all new developments.

RNA would like to thank every person who contributed their own time and energy to this important project. RNA has consistently maintained the position that we are for development but we are

against overdevelopment that will destroy the character and tradition of our neighborhood. We are strong as a united voice - one that, if necessary, will be heard throughout the chambers of City Hall. When we fight for our neighborhood we are fighting for our lives. Again, it was a team effort that won these victories and it can only be done with a continuing commitment from every one of you.

Riverview Park: Because of the worsening situation in Riverview Park, especially evidenced this summer, angry residents decided to demand action from the police and city officials. On August 3rd, RNA presented to the Community Relations Council a petition containing over 360 signatures, protesting the deplorable conditions of the Park. (Copies of this petition were also sent to the Mayor, members of the City Council, and the Police Director.)

The following are the worst offenses:

- 1) gangs of young people hang out and act in anti-social ways,
- 2) the widespread use and sale of drugs,
- 3) the rampant consumption of beer and alcohol,
- 4) the constant littering of garbage, glass bottles and beer cans,
- 5) the shattering of glass bottles on the pavement and grass,
- 6) the playing of loud music till 1:00-2:00 AM,
- 7) playing basketball till 1:00-2:00 AM,
- 8) car thefts, breakins, and vandalism,
- 9) cars speeding on the street,
- 10) cars repaired and abandoned on the street, and
- 11) graffiti throughout the Park.

Our community has been more or less "content" to hear officials and the police say "we're doing the best with what we've got"! Now however, it is clear that their "best" is not good enough! Our city officials and, we as residents, have failed at providing a decent Park for recreation and, more importantly,

at protecting ourselves from crime and other negative activities that dominate the Park and its surroundings.

On August 17th, a coalition of representatives from various neighborhood and block associations and concerned neighbors met in the Park, in front of the pavilion to take matters into their own hands. Stating that they were all aware of the negative conditions, they concentrated on positive solutions to improve the Park. Realizing that this should be a two-prong attack, two separate lists were compiled: one demanding better services from the city and the other stating a group of citizen-organized activities to take place in the Park. The following are the demands that the community is making of the city:

- 1) more frequent police patrols in the Park to enforce laws against drugs, alcohol, noise, theft, vandalism and the 10:00 curfew,

- 2) the proper and timely repair and maintenance of the Park and its facilities, including the pavilion, sidewalks, trees and landscape,

- 3) installation of benches, better lighting and trash cans,

- 4) the implementation of the CDBG/NIP program for structural improvements in the Park (over \$57,000.00 allocated),

- 5) conversion of the boarded-up rooms in the bottom of the pavilion as a police substation,

- 6) installation of "speed bumps" on Ogden Avenue at Griffith and Bowers Streets, and

- 7) allocation of funds for community-organized activities. The following list is the first phase of these activities that can be organized by the community:

- a) letters to the Alcoholic Beverages Commission and local retailers asking to cooperate in our campaign against selling liquor to minors,

- b) letters to local retailers to strictly observe the city ordinance prohibiting the open display of spray paint cans and the sale of spray paint to minors,

c) community education of ordinances regarding drugs, alcohol, noise, graffiti, thefts, vandalism and the curfew,

d) establishment of a community "hot-line" for the purpose of gathering our own crime statistics,

e) the establishment of a youth basketball league in the month of September culminating in a tournament with prizes,

f) organization of two fall music concerts in the Park pavilion: the first occurring during the Labor Day weekend and the second during Heights Pride Week (also possible picnics scheduled for the same day), and

e) organization of a demonstration at City Hall to present our demands and recommendations and to ask for support of these above planned activities.

If this two-fold agenda is successful this fall, we will spend the winter months planning and organizing a whole season of similar activities for the summer of 1988.

As we go to press two events are being planned: the City Hall demonstration and the next meeting in the Park on August 31st.

d) December 7 (first Monday) - election of officers.

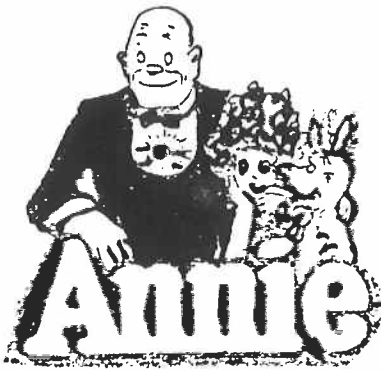
